EL 7th Grade Raiders Win; 8th Loses

Eagle Lake Middle School Raiders split a pair of games with the Hallettsville junior high teams in ELMS stadium last Thursday evening, the seventh graders winning by a score of 14 to 6 while the eighth graders lost a 14 to 0 decision.

The seventh graders rushed for a total of 213 yards and held Hallettsville to 109. Each team had a first down. The locals were penalized 5 times for 55 yards and Hallettsville 6 times for 30 yards. Halfback Kenneth Hemphill led the Raiders runners with 157 yards and fullback Terry Cotton accounted for 66.

Hemphill scored both touchdowns in the second quarter, the first with 1:24 left in the half from 6 yards out and the second with 36 seconds left to play in the half on a 74 yard run. Quarterback John Dawson ran for the two point conversion. Hallettsville rallied with 1:10 left in the second quarter.

Highlights for the Raiders found Dawson recovering an Eagle Lake fumble and flankerback Ronnie Fry recovered two other Raider bobbles. Coaches Glenn Rando and Jack Seales praised the defense.

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Gators Sosh To 54-0 Win

Raiders Unable To Contain QB, Passes For 5 TDs

The Dickinson Gaits, District AAAA leaders, proved their adaptability to water as they sloshed their way to an impressive 54 to 0 win over the Rice High School Raiders on a rainy, rainy night in Raider Stadium last Friday night. Rain started to fall shortly after the opening kickoff and fell throughout the game thoroughly drenching the field, the players and the few handfuls of spectators.

In spite of the wet conditions, the Gaits combined an outstanding passing game off the arm of 185 pound quarterback Donnie Little. He had a super night for Dickinson, picking up 14 yards on fourteen carries including a 17 yard touchdown run and he tossed five touchdowns passes to five different receivers. He hit Jeff Laflair for a 23 yard TD, Marty Harelerode for a 26 yard TD, Gary McKenzie for 2 yards out, Bill Cary from 5 and Kevin Herderson for 12. Laflair also picked up his yardage with touchdowns from the 3 and 8. Dennis David kicked six extra points to total up the Gaits' 54 point production for the night.

The Raiders, who have a bad habit of fumbling even on a dry field, found things real tough Friday night as they bobbed the ball eleven times and lost four of them, all of which resulted in eventual Gaits touchdowns. Rice started for 101 yards and tried only one pass, that one incomplete. Other passing attempts found quarterback Clayton Smith in big trouble from a hard-charging Dickinson line. Rice pointed seven times for a 27.5 average, had 8 first downs, drew five penalties for 85 yards. One of the penalties, for clipping near midfield, wiped out a beautiful 90 yard touchdown run by quarterback Smith. The biggest thrill of the night for the rain-soaked Raider partisans.

Dickinson rushed for 285 yards, completed 9 of 18 passes, for 138 yards for a total yardage of 423 and 10 first downs. They punted only one time, that one for 48 yards. The Gaits drew eleven penalties for 75 yards and fumbled.

2 Important Water Issues on Nov. 2 Ballot

AUSTIN—Two important water measures—one controversial, the other generally accepted—will be on the general election ballot.

Proposition 1 would amend the state constitution to authorize another \$400 million in water development bonds.

Proposition 2, by constitutional amendment, seeks to authorize another \$100 million in bonds for water quality.

Under Proposition 1, no more than \$35 million in proceeds from bond sale could go to any one project without approval of the legislature. None of the money could go to developing water resources from the Mississippi River.

The additional water quality bonds would go to grants and loans to local governments to improve sewage treatment systems of Gov. Dolph Briscoe and other statewide officials, including Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton, support both issues.

Proponents argue the water development fund is almost exhausted and adequate water supplies may be jeopardized in the future unless more money is provided. The fund has financed about \$300 million in development projects and about \$100 million is left.

Environmentalists argue against giving Water Development Board uncontrolled authority to spend on water projects. Opposition spokesmen claim there is no plan, environmental study or economic assessment to guide the \$400 million bond authority.

Funds Approved
The House Higher Education Committee approved increased funds for tuition equalization grants.

Under the program, students can get as much as \$600 a year toward educational expenses. TEG received \$16 million in legislative appropriations this year.

The House committee recommended the legislature appropriate 50 percent of funds for 150 new family medicine residency programs in 1977 and 30 additional places in 1978.

An increase of about \$4,950,000 would be required for the additional assistance aimed at increasing the number of physicians in Texas.

Another recommendation of the committee would require graduate students who serve as teaching assistants to complete internships first and would limit the number of assistants to the number of fulltime faculty members.

The Railroad Commission denied two of three requests of Common Cause for promulgation of rules for regulation of gas utilities. It accepted for consideration a set of proposed rules pertaining to quality of service performed by the utilities.

The 29th annual Texas Conference on Teacher Education at San Antonio October 24-25 will examine current teacher programs and problems.
