Gerald Birdwell Delivers Address To American Psychological Assn.

Texas Cities, Counties Spend \$212.2 Million Revenue Sharing Report Made

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that an analysis by his office shows that Texas cities and counties spent a combined total of \$212.2 million in federal revenue sharing funds during the fiscal year 1975, which ended June 30, 1976.

Bullock said cities spent 72 percent of their \$132.3 million in revenue sharing allotments for capital improvements and the remaining 28 percent for operating expenses.

Counties he said spent 82 percent of their \$79.9 million in allotments on capital improvements and 38 percent on operating expenses.

The analysis of local government use of federal revenue sharing funds was contained in the Comptroller's September monthly financial statement.

Austin lived up to its reputation as the focal point for women in politics during an event scheduled around U.S. Rep. Lindy Boggs (D-La.) held Sunday, Oct. 17 at 4 p.m. at Green Pastures Restaurant, 811 W. Live Oak.

Rep. Boggs was the honored guest at a reception which brought together hundreds of politically-active Democratic women from across the state.

The reception was staged for the 51.3 Percent Committee, a women's group organized to promote the election of Jimmy Carter.

Rep. Boggs is a member of the national steering committee of the 51.3 Percent Committee, which takes its name from the percentage of women in the U.S. population.

Anderson Says Carter Wrong On Food Production

"It turns out that what that little old South Georgia farmer Jimmy Carter knows about this nation's agriculture could be housed in a peanut," according to Jay Anderson, Chairman of the Texas Farmers and Ranchers for President Ford.

During the second debate with President Ford, Carter commented that one of his goals would be to make the United States the breadbasket of the world.

"If Carter would have only noticed the bountiful food production going on all around him he would know that by any standard measure this nation is the breadbasket of the world—both in terms of commercial sales and of food aid to the world's needy," Anderson said.

"If he asked he would find out that American farmers, without subsidies and under unrestricted production, last year provided food and clothing for 213 million Americans and still had enough left over to export 80 per cent of their wheat, 55 per cent of their rice, 50 per cent of their soybeans, 40 per cent of their cotton, and 20 per cent of their corn," Anderson said.

"Those farm exports brought into this country \$22.1 billion, enough to give the United States a favorable balance of payments despite the huge cost of foreign oil," Anderson said.

Former Resident Maynard I. Landa Dies

Maynard I. Landa, a former executive of the Cities Service Oil Co., died in Greenwich, Conn., on Sunday, Oct. 10, 1976, aged 78.

He was born in Luling, Texas, the son of Max M. Landa and Bessie Landa, who were citizens of Eagle Lake, from 1909.

Mr. Landa grew up in Hallettsville and Eagle Lake, and then attended Texas A&M where he took the Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering. He was in the armed services in World War I as an officer, and in 1919 he joined the Cities Service Oil Co. as a trainee. His entire career was spent with Cities Service in its various divisions and as advisor to the president. Eventually he became a vice president of Cities Service Oil Co.

He was active in many national committees, among them the American Petroleum Institute, who awarded him a Certificate of Appreciation in 1961; the National Petroleum Council, American Institute of Electrical Engineers, and the New York Society of Analysts. He had a wide reputation in the oil industry as a specialist in oil operations and oil industry finance. On his retirement in 1965 he moved from New York City to Greenwich, Conn.

He leaves a wife, Amanda Van der Voort Landa, a brother, Louis, a retired member of the Princeton University faculty; and a sister, Evelyn Landa Nixon, a resident of Houston.

Burial was in the family plot at Lakeside Cemetery in Eagle Lake.

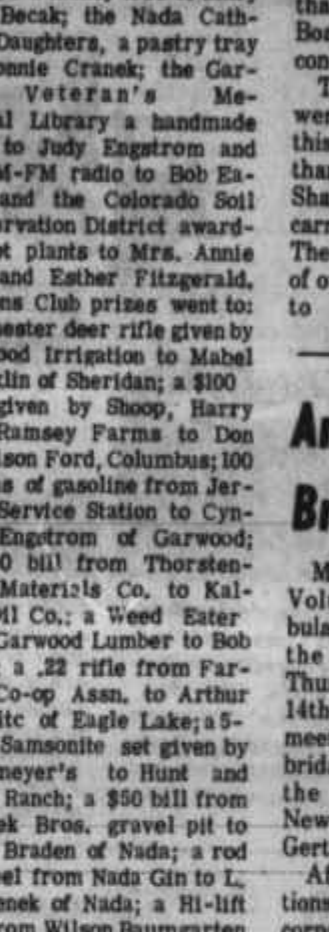
