Dewey Compton, Son, Wives Die In Plane Crash

Dewey Compton, 49, popular radio host, and his three children, 12, 10, and 8, were killed Saturday in a crash of his small plane about five miles southwest of College Station in Burleson County.

Killed with Compton in the crash were his wife, Curtis Perry Compton, 49; their son, Ronnie Compton, 23; and his daughter, Sara Hart Compton, 27. There were no other people in the plane.

Ronnie Compton was piloting the twin engine Piper Apache and apparently became disoriented in a heavy rain and fog, according to Burleson County Department of Public Safety officer Ralph Mutchler.

Hal Kemp, station manager for radio station KTRH in Houston, where Compton had worked since 1963, said the Compton family flew to College Station to pick up some plants that Compton was going to place in an Israeli exhibit at the State Fair in Dallas. —Houston Chronicle.

Compton was a visitor and speaker here on numerous occasions and his sudden death, along with those of his son and his wives, brought great sadness to his friends and acquaintances in the area.

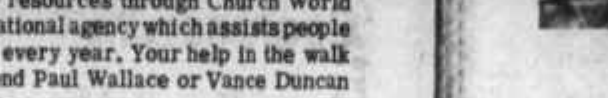

Fire Ruins Where Man Died



Officers probe the charred ruins of the Raymond (Jiggs) Graves home on East A Street for clues that might lead to the identification of a badly burned body found inside the home after fire destroyed the home and contents in the early morning hours last Friday. The body still had not been definitely identified late Tuesday.

Local and Department of Public Safety authorities were still trying late Tuesday to get positive identification of the body of a man found burned beyond recognition, following a fire in the Raymond (Jiggs) Graves home on A Street in the Allen addition a block off east Main Street early last Friday morning.

It is thought that the body may be that of Mr. Graves but all efforts of the officers working on the case in cooperation with Justice of the Peace M. M. Jones have been unable to make a positive identification.

Mr. Jones said that the U. S. Armed Forces, the Veterans Hospital in Houston, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation have been contacted for possible records that might lead to a positive identification. Mr. Graves was a member of the U. S. Air Force in World War II, and spent some time in the Houston hospital several years ago.

Eagle Lake volunteer firemen were called to the scene by neighbors who awoke to find the wood frame home in flames at 5 a.m. By the time the firemen arrived, the fire was out of control and the house was completely destroyed by the fire. The firemen found the body in the living room of the home, lying partially in a bedroom and partially in a living room area clad in what appears to be pajama bottoms, but with a shirt and shoes still on the charred remains.

Chief of Police Bufford Ashley headed the local investigation and he was assisted by FBI officers who arrived late Tuesday.

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1st Reading Dog Ordinance Passes

Eagle Lake City Council, in session Tuesday night, passed the first reading of a dog control and restraining ordinance unanimously and the second reading is scheduled for Nov. 9th. If approved then and at the third reading on Nov. 23rd, the ordinance will become effective immediately.

A full copy of the ordinance may be found on page 15 of this issue.

The ordinance strengthens the regulations for control of dogs, on and off private property, and places more responsibility on the owner. The stiffer fines are set for violation of the ordinance.

The ordinance does not include a kennel fee for having more than two dogs, nor does it permit removal of dogs from private property without the owner's consent. Two proposals that were highly debated in preliminary discussions. As a result of the opposition to those provisions, they were omitted from the revised version passed at the first reading Tuesday night.

Roaming Dogs Under New Ordinance

Under the new ordinance, when finally approved, dogs running at large on the streets or on property other than that of the dog's owner, will be subject to being picked up and placed in the city pound. Under the old ordinance, only those animals without registration and vaccination tags were picked up but under the new provisions, any dog roaming

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
