ing, as well as maintenance. Hospitals have nothing to gain from high costs, and are as unhappy about them as everyone else. Curiously enough, those with most at stake—hospitals and hospital patients—are not in the best position to control costs. Moreover, the bulk of hospital charges aren't paid directly by patients, but by health insurance and government programs. And, while the government and insurers try to limit how much money they should pay hospitals, hospitals can't limit how much they have to pay for most goods and services.

Gov't Controls Up Costs
In order for the Eagle Lake Community Hospital to operate as a hospital facility there are many government controls which we must follow to operate, which increases the cost of operation. We are faced with Medicare, Medicaid, the State Department of Health, O.S.H.A., Professional Services Review, and Utilization Review regulations, just to name a few. We might add at this point that our hospital is in complete compliance with all regulations that we are bound under to follow.

The Eagle Lake Community Hospital Board of Directors, physicians, administrators, and employees are aware of the high cost of health care. We are always striving to keep the cost as low as possible. Cost studies are done to insure that we are getting the best quality of

Right To Read (R2R) Program Discussed at Rotary

Mrs. Vera Brown, the new Reading Coordinator for the Rice Consolidated School District was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday of last week and she discussed the Right To Read (R2R) program. "You have undoubtedly seen the R2R posters and signs about the community and you wondered what they stood for," noted the speaker.

The Right To Read program involves comprehensive testing of children in grades one through three and features a better utilization of existing materials to effect a gain in reading skills, said the speaker. The Eagle Lake School is the target or pilot school in the Rice District for implementation of the program and students in the school will be compared to those in other communities representing a cross-section of students.

Mrs. Brown commented that the Right To Read program does not require any new taxes or any new money of any kind, but is simply a better utilization of the materials available and a "little more thinking."

She stressed that the program is designed to teach children to "like to read" and she urged parents to cooperate by reading to their children and in making reading a daily habit. She noted that 80 percent of the child's motivation, attitudes, work habits and cultural self-expectations are reached by the time the pupil enters school.

Lack of motivation is the leading problem in the schools, said Mrs. Brown and she added that 15 percent of the child's learning is to be very good. . . Skinner was unable to keep up with the auto, in the city's police car, but the highway patrol car brought the car to a stop on McCarty street after it had struck a car in a private drive.
