Garwood - Sheridan Back In Win Column, Top Schulenburg

End Season In Shiner Thursday

The Garwood and Sheridan Raiders football team got back in the win column last Thursday when they edged the Schulenburg junior high team 24-14 in a hard-fought contest in Garwood.

The Raiders are now 4-2-1 for the season and the Schulenburg team is 1-4-1 in a hard-fought contest in Garwood.

In last week's game, coaches Mike Stansifer and Henry Kahlich moved lineman John Schneider to the backfield and he was the big gun in the Raider offense, scoring the touchdown and the extra points.

The Raiders had several good drives going in the first half but always seemed to lose steam near the goal line.

To open the second half, Schulenburg scored early on

Raiders Lose To Wharton 25-7

Lone TD Comes On Fumble Recovery

Defense was the name of the game for the Rice Raiders last Friday night as they spent most of the evening in that department and the defense scored the Raiders' only touchdown of the game as Rice dropped a 25 to 7 decision to the Wharton Tigers in Wharton.

It was the seventh loss of the season for the Raiders but probably their best outing of the season on defense.

The first few minutes of play proved to be the Raiders' undoing as Wharton forced a Rice punt after taking the opening kickoff on the 20. After picking up 15 yards on a Rice fumble, the Raiders were able to move and Gale Thompson scored a touchdown with a stiff breeze and it rolled over the goal line for a 53 yard score.

The Rice defense led by Kevin Mackey, Danny and David Henderson, Mike Thompson and Kenneth Dankels shut down the Tiger offense after the kick.

On the first play from scrimmage after the kick, the Raiders bobbled the ball and Wharton recovered and four plays later Farris had scored from the 4 and Wharton led 13-0 with 6:13 left in the first period.

The Raiders were unable to generate any offense in the first half with a minus 2

A hard charge by the Raiders caused a fumbled Wharton recovered for a two yard loss. Another hard charge by the defense forced another fumble and this time the ball rolled over the goal line and Kevin Mackey fell on the ball to give Rice the TD with one second left to play.

Garwood, the smallest player on the field, booted the extra point and the half ended 13-7.

Homecoming Night

The Rice Raider led, led on the field by Drum Major July Ashby and twirlers Paisi Mathis, Lisa Mahalle, Sharon Hoffman and Becky Gertson, turned in an excellent half-time performance. It was homecoming for Wharton and Miss Nancy Krenk was named the 1976 homecoming queen during the Tiger band's half-time show.

The third period of play proved to be scoreless although the Tigers marched to near paydirt at the close of the period. The Raider defense, with Dankels, Henderson, Clarence Davis and Leo Sims getting key tackles forced the second Tiger punt of the night and the ball rolled dead on the Rice 5. From that point the Raiders had their best offensive effort. Dwight Rhodes ran for 3, Bubala added 3 and Rhodes broke loose for 26 before being hauled down on the 27. A Bubala to Krenk pass for 13 yards set up another first and Wharton drew a 15 yard penalty for personal foul and Rice had the ball on the Wharton 32. Bubala gained 2, an offside by Wharton gave Rice 5 free yards, but on the next play, Lechlar intercepted a pass to give the Raiders the ball on the 22.

Right To Own Firearms May Be In Balance Tuesday

TO COLORADO COUNTY VOTERS:

October 18, 1976

An anti-gun or anti-hunting cabinet directing the Federal bureaucracy is a distinct possibility and a threat to all sportsmen, hunters and firearms owners if Jimmy Carter is elected President. Carter's close aide and his money raisers read like a list of "Who's Who" of the anti-gun movement.

Morris Dees, National Gun Control Center, believes, as does Carter, that no citizen should be allowed to own a handgun, without it being registered. Dees heads the general counsel for the "Committee for Jimmy Carter" and is the man touted by some of the media as a possible nominee for Attorney General.

Patrick Murphy says, "For too long we have indulged the gun maniacs both criminal and law-abiding. The Wall Street Journal says that Murphy may well be named in the Carter administration as the head of the FBI."

U.S. Congressman Andrew Young is a member of the Dees' anti-gun group. In a Time article Young was described as the only man to whom Jimmy Carter "owed anything."

Congressman Peter Rodino, chairman of the powerful House Judiciary Committee, said his ultimate goal in gun control was the abolition of private ownership of handguns. Rodino gave the principal nominating speech for Jimmy Carter at the Democratic National Convention.

Jimmy Carter's stand on the gun control issue is bad enough, but to judge it is necessary to look at the people around him. Those listed above are some of "his" people. Carter's campaign literature says "I favor registration of handguns, a ban on the sale of cheap handguns, reasonable licensing provisions including a waiting period. . . What is reasonable? Ask yourself, 'Do we defend our second amendment?'"

Vote carefully, as if your right to own firearms depended on it. There may not be another chance.

ELMS 7th, 8th Graders Lose; Go To Columbus For Final Games Thurs.

Eagle Lake Middle School Raider football teams lost both of their games in Wharton last Thursday night. The 7th and 8th grade Raiders and their 1976 season this Thursday with games at 5:30 and 7:00 in Columbus.

In the opener last Thursday in Wharton, the 7th graders dropped a 30-0 decision. They trailed alltime 10-0. Wharton rolled up 206 yards and had 9 first downs and Eagle Lake had 53 yards and 4 first downs. Eagle Lake drew 3 penalties and Wharton 4.

Halfback Kenneth Hemphill led Raider runners with 48 yards and Terry Cotton ran for 6. Defensive tackle James Moss intercepted a pass in the second quarter.

The Eagle Lake 8th graders gave up 22 points to Wharton in the first half but then held the Tigers scoreless in the second period while scoring one time themselves to run the score to 22 to 6 at the final whistle.

Eagle Lake rushed for 104 yards and had 4 first downs while Wharton rolled up 247 yards and had 14 first downs. Eagle Lake drew two penalties for 10 yards and Wharton 8 for 90 yards. Defensive tackle Bruno Leal recovered a Wharton fumble in the first quarter.

Leading Raider runners were fullback Roger Fry with 62 yards and quarterback Robert Barrion added 4 and halfback Ernest Fields 38.

Fry scored the Raider TD in the fourth quarter on a 4 yard run. The Raiders humbled the ball four times during the first half, three of which were lost to Wharton. Coaches say these were costly errors and helped to set up two of Wharton's touchdowns in the first quarter. The third Tiger TD came on a 70 yard run.

TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE BIOLOGISTS HAVE COMPLETED PLANS FOR THE ISSUANCE OF DOE PERMITS FOR THE 1976 SEASON AT THE COUNTY COURTHOUSE IN COLUMBUS THURS. AND FRI. OCT. 28TH AND 29TH.

The permits will be issued from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days and landowners or agents are to appear in person for the permits. The biologists note that the permit will be issued for the full amount of acres in either of the four designated areas and not for a portion thereof.

LCRA Announces Conservation Program

Blue and Snow Goose Season Opens Sat.

A new conservation program, designed to preserve and improve the quality of lands administered by the Lower Colorado River Authority along the Highland Lakes and Lake Bastrop, has been approved by the LCRA board of directors.

The 21 tracts involved in the conservation program are among those leased by the LCRA for grazing. Most of the land was acquired as flooding easements when the Highland Lakes dams were built.

Under the new program, stockmen interested in leasing the lands for grazing were asked to submit bids and to agree to comply with requirements designed to prevent overgrazing and provide improvement of the land.

Jim Shepperd, Range Conservationist with the Authority's Parks Development Department, developed plans unique to each tract which specify the number and type of livestock which may be grazed, and include a schedule of improvements to be made to each piece of land.

The improvements—which will be credited against the annual lease payment—include brush control, construction of stock tanks, crossfencing, and provisions for proper grazing use and rotation grazing.

Revenue from the leases will be used in part to defray expenses of maintaining the public parks on other LCRA land and is more accessible for recreational use.

Shepperd said the range improvements will benefit livestock as well as wildlife in the lakes area.

A run for 10 gave the ball back to Rice and their own 26. But this didn't last long, as a Rice fumble turned the ball back over to Wharton with 1:04 left to play. Dankels and Danny Henderson and Tommy Garza led the defense in stopping play at that point as the game ended.

Rice had a total of five first downs and gained 30 yards on the ground and 32 yards on four completions on nine passes attempted. One was intercepted. They punted six times for a 30 yard average and fumbled the ball three times and lost two of these. Rice had 2 penalties for 10 yards.

The Tigers rolled for 292 yards on the ground and completed two of four passes for 31 yards for a 323 yard total. They punted twice for a 33 yard average and drew 10 penalties for 100 yards. Wharton had 17 first downs and fumbled the ball 3 times and lost two to recoveries by Mackey and Smith.

Friday night the Raiders take a long trip to Brazosport to meet the Exporters in another District 14A-A contest with kickoff time at 7:30. Rice high school will dismiss an hour earlier in order that school buses may complete their routes and be available for the long road trip.
