opposed by Independent candidate Edward Woolery-Price, Columbus attorney.

Incumbent County Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker, in Precinct 3, is the Democratic nominee and he is being opposed by write-in candidate Lester Kanstainer.

Other write-in contests which have developed are: Democratic nominee Houston Munson, seeking re-election as District Attorney for the 4-county 25th Judicial District, including Colorado, Lavaca, Guadalupe and Gonzales counties, is opposed by write-in candidate M. K. Johnson, Hallettsville attorney; and Democratic nominee for re-election as Constable of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, Colorado County, Lawrence Berger, is opposed by write-in candidate E. H. (Ed) Wine of Garwood, former County Deputy Sheriff in the Garwood-Nada area. Precinct 2 includes the voting boxes of Garwood, Nada, Rock Island and Sheridan.

Houston attorney Tom Loran is a write-in candidate for the position of Associate Justice, Supreme Court Place 2, opposing the Democratic nominee Don Yarbrough.

Vote on 2 Amendments
Voters will also cast ballots Tuesday for or against two amendments to the Texas Constitution. The two are important water measures—one controversial, the other generally accepted.

Proposition 1 would amend the state constitution to authorize another \$400 million in water-development bonds.

Proposition 2, by constitutional amendment, seeks to authorize another \$100 million in bonds for water quality.

Under proposition 1, no more than \$35 million in proceeds from bond sale could go to any one project without approval of the

legislature. None of the money could go to development of water resources from the Mississippi River.

The additional water quality bonds would go to grants and loans to local governments to improve sewage treatment systems.

Proponents argue the water development fund is almost exhausted and adequate water supplies may be jeopardized in the future unless more money is provided. Environmentalists argue against giving the Water Development Board uncontrolled authority to spend on water projects.

Absentee Voting

Absentee voting ends this Friday, Oct. 29th and indications are that a record number of absentee ballots will be cast. On Tuesday of this week, a total of 250 persons had applied for absentee ballots at the office of County Clerk Lester Schneider in Columbus, as compared to a total of 270 absentee ballots cast in the 1972 presidential election year.

A sample copy of the ballot may be found on page 16 of this issue.

The ballot is a large one, 21 inches by 16½ inches, but with very few (6) choices to make, unless you plan to do some writing in.

If you wish to vote a straight party ballot, you may place an "X" in the square beside the name of the party of your choice at the head of the party column; or you may split your vote and cast your vote for the candidates of your choice, in either party, by placing an "X" in the square beside the candidate's name. It should be noted that if you choose to place an X in the square beside the party of your choice, your write-in votes will not be legal. If you do not place an X beside the party of your choice, then you will need to place an X beside the name of every candidate for whom you wish to vote.

Autopsy Ordered

Mr. Jones ordered that the body be sent to the Harris County Medical Examiner's office for an autopsy and for information that might lead to the identification. A preliminary report received this week by Judge Jones indicated that the victim was a white male, from 45 to 55 years of age.

Officers sifted through the rubble carefully in search of items that might lead to identification and also to check if there had been foul play leading to the fire and death. All utilities to the home were connected and in operating order, but all heaters and jets were closed. Cause of the fire remains a mystery. It is apparent however, from the extent of damage to the front portion that the blaze originated in the front bedroom of the home. It was known that Mr. Graves, better known to friends here as Jiggs, did not smoke. He had been living in the home alone, but had been known to have friends in overnight. He is 54 years of age.

JP Jones found in his investigation that Graves accompanied a distant relative, Robert Segelquist of Freeport, to Freeport on Tuesday of last week to work in that area. Mr. Segelquist told the officer that he brought Mr. Graves home at around 8:30 p.m. Thursday, and that apparently was the last time that he was seen.

Body Still Here

The body is at the Mill-Bauer Funeral Home pending positive identification, and if not identified in the next several days, it may have to be sent back to Houston until such time as positive identification can be made.

Graves' mother, Mrs. Roy Graves, resides near a daughter, Mrs. Mary Tedder in Palacios. They and two other sisters, Mrs. Clara Hough of Lissie and Mrs. Vera Dorsey of Houston, have assisted officers in identifying some of the clothing and other items found in the home but to date, evidence sufficient for positive identification of the body still remains to be brought to light.

Dog Ordinance

at large may be picked up.

The ordinance also sets out that: "It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog owned, possessed, kept, or harbored by him to be at large unless leashed and under control on the streets, alleys, or public places or on private premises not under the control of the said owner, within the limits of the City of Eagle Lake, Texas. Any person must restrain such dog

on his own property by any of the following methods: 1. in an adequate pen, 2. on an adequate leash or chain, 3. within the confines of a house, or 4. by personal attendance to such dog when dog is free of other restraints. Any police officer of the City of Eagle Lake may enforce the above requirements by citation, but no dog may be taken from private property without the permission of the property owner except in an emergency declared by the Chief of Police, City Manager, or acting Mayor."

Provision is made for handicapped persons to apply for permission for special conditions.

Vicious Dogs

Dogs which bite, scratch or otherwise attack a person may be judged to be vicious by the Corporate Court Judge, after a public hearing on such matter is held, and the animal can be impounded or if unable to be taken up, can be slain by an authorized officer.

Another section sets out regulations for judging a pet to be a nuisance by virtue of constant barking or howling (Sec. 13).

Persons found guilty of violation of any of the provisions of the ordinance may be fined \$10 on the first offense, \$20 on the second, \$40 on the third, \$80 on the fourth, and up to \$100 for the fifth and succeeding violations.

Mayor Elmer Struss personally took a copy of the ordinance for attorneys of the Texas Municipal League in Austin to check for legality and they judged the instrument to be a very good and enforceable one meeting all constitutional requirements.

Other Action

A report on other activities of Tuesday night's city council meeting, including a discussion of CPL's proposed rate increase; action on federally funded projects in which the city is participating; on a discussion of law enforcement activities with the Rev. Joe James; and others, will be published next week.
