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Garwood Fire Dept. Gets \$75 Farm Bu. Check

13 Cases Handled In Oct. Term County Court

Thirteen cases were handled by County Judge Lester J. Crane in the October term of County Court, eight of them on driving while intoxicated charges and three on marijuana charges.

Tried on the driving while intoxicated charges were: Harvey Lee Pustejovsky, defendant failed to appear, state's motion for judgment nisi was approved; Lonnie Johnson, motion to dismiss was approved; Edward Edm. Thompson, pleaded guilty and fined \$100 and sentenced to 3 days in the county jail; Manuel Dominguez, pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 and sentenced to 30 days in the jail but one-year probation was granted on the jail sentence.

Also, Norman Edward McGinnis, pleaded nolo contendere and was found guilty and fined \$220 and 3 days in jail; Fidel Bejarano Cavazos, defendant failed to appear and state's judgment nisi approved; Samuel Gonzalez III, pleaded guilty and fined \$190 and 3 days in jail; and Kathleen Lora Sherrill, pleaded nolo contendere and fined \$50.

Tried on marijuana charges were: Louis Ray Barrow, pleaded guilty, and sentenced to 180 days in jail, jail sentence suspended; Louis Rhodes, defendant found guilty and fined \$150 and sentenced to 30 days in jail and 6-month probation was given on the jail sentence; and James Moses Wilkinson, pleaded guilty and was fined \$150 and sentenced to 30 days in jail but a 6-month probation was granted on the jail sentence.

In other cases: Joe L. Acuna failed to appear and the state's motion for judgment nisi was approved; and Esnie McCarter White, carrying a prohibited weapon, pleaded guilty and was fined \$150.

Four civil suits were filed in District Court during the past week.

On Nov. 3rd a suit was filed by Montgomery Ward Co., Inc. vs. David E. Bunch seeking judgment for a past due debt in the amount of \$239.46. The suit also asks \$300 attorney's fees and interest.

The four new board members and the carryover directors are due to meet in December for the election of 1977 officers.

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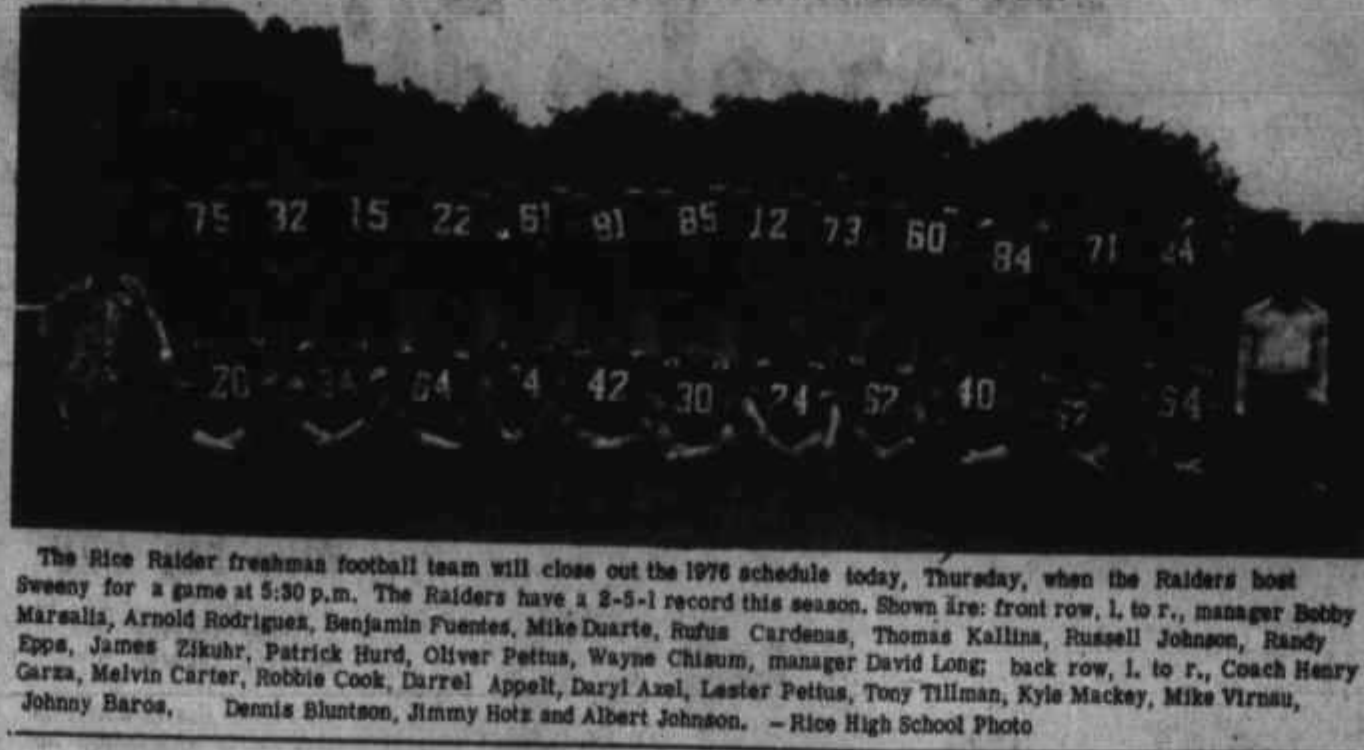
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Rice Raider Freshman Football Team
