Rice Raiders End Winless Season

The Rice High School Raiders' season ended at the door Friday night on one of the school's most disastrous seasons, losing to the Sweeneys Bulldogs by a score of 35 to 8 on a wet and cold night in Sweeney Stadium. By the time the game was over only a few handfuls of fans remained huddled on each side of the field.
The Raiders, after giving up 21 points in the first quarter, seven more in the second and seven more in the third, began to warm up their offense and punched across the sixth touchdown of the season on a 23 yard run by Steve Epps.
While abhorring the last defeat, Rice in District 14-A competition, the Raiders allowed a total of 383 points while they managed 39.
Eleven Seniors
It was the final game of their high school career for eleven seniors including fullback Steve Epps, halfback Dwight Rhodes, fullback Thomas Glover, fullback Danny Henderson, guard Richard Lujan, center Gale Thompson, defensive end Mike Thompson, tackle Milton Anderson, end Lloyd Powell, end Terry Krenk and end Marvin Thomas.
The Sweeney Bulldogs got their scoring started, much to the delight of a partisan homecoming crowd, with a 58 yard punt in the first quarter after fielding a punt on their own 48. The final 59 yards came on a pass from quarterback Eddie Kottis to running back Larry Woodward. The kick try by Greg Finley was wide. Less than a minute later the Raiders' backfield coughed up the ball for the first of four times during the night, on the Rice 21. It took Johnny Higgins 3 runs to crash into paydirt, the final run for two yards and the score. A pass from Kottis to Leroy Johnson for the two points was deflected but Johnson grabbed the ball on the rebound for the two point conversion.
The Raiders were unable to get a single yard on three tries following the kickoff. Gale Thompson punted to the Sweeneys 40. Kottis ran for 5 and then Higgins broke free up the middle and outdistanced Rice defenders for a 55 yard run and Finley kicked the extra point to up the score to 21-0, with 2:12 left in the first quarter.
Rice took the kickoff on its own 20. Danny Henderson shook free for a 12 yard gain and the 32, 3 rushing penalty on a 5 yard run by quarterback Greg Bubela added 15 to the Sweeneys 46 but drive halted abruptly on another Rice fumble as the first period ended.
Late in the second quarter the Bulldogs took a Thompson punt on their own 21 and marched in four first downs, aided by a 21 yard pass interference call against Rice to the Rice 11. Kottis flipped a pass to Johnson for the last nine yards and Finley kicked the extra point to up the lead to 28 to 0.
Rice got its best offense of the first half going after taking the kickoff on their own 18. Bubela ran for 16 to the 36. Epps picked up five for another first on the 47, an offside against Sweeney set up another first on the Bulldogs 39 but the drive bogged when a double reverse was thrown for a seven yard loss as the first half ended 28-0.
