Rotary Has Program On African Art

Eagle Lake Rotarians had an outstanding program on Africa and African art at their meeting on Wednesday of last week. The guest speaker for the day was Carl Provost, owner of an art gallery in Houston who spent ten years in Africa. Mr. Provost, educated in the United States and France, speaks five languages and also eight African languages fluently. He was introduced by Everett Anderson, program chairman for the day, who said that Provost has over 2000 pieces of outstanding African art in his studio. He also is noted for his work in restoring African art.

Mr. Provost's program included a slide film presentation in which he discussed and showed with emphasis by color slides the parallel between our culture and a primitive society, such as exists in most of Africa. He especially stressed the difference between programs for the control of criminals and violence. "We, in the United States are a violent people compared to the African," he commented. "Law and order prevails at all times in an African village, there are no policemen, no jails."

He contributed this to the breakdown of the family system in the United States and to moral decay.

He said, "In Africa, a unified family structure results in law and order." He stressed the fact that the head of the family or the chief or king of the tribe is the final authority and he is respected because of the great power that he maintains over his family. He also stressed the closeness and participation of all members of the family in a tribe.

His discussion was mostly concerning the western portion of Africa and in an area of approximately the size of the North American continent. Provost noted that this area is the last in Africa to oppose the take-over of the Islam religion which forbids any works of art.

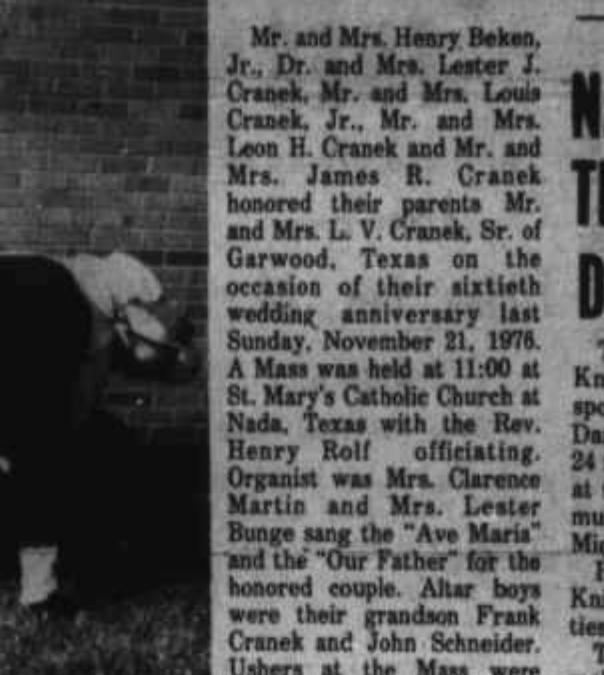

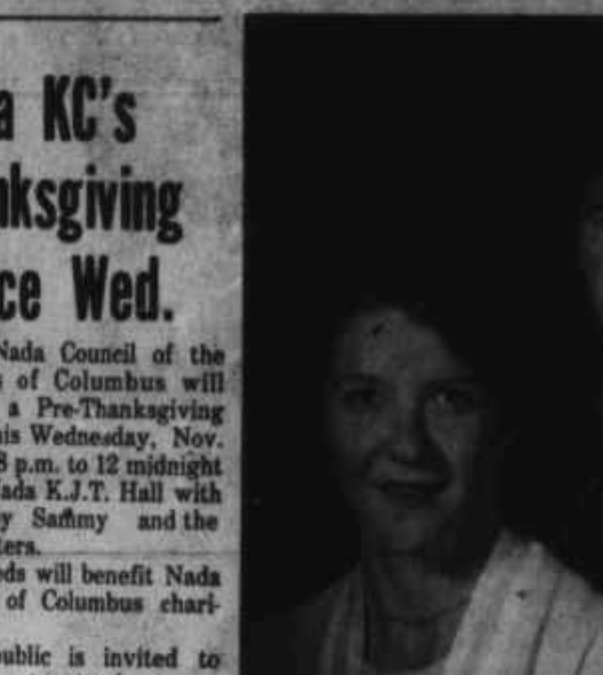
