It is sponsored jointly by Colorado and Fayette counties' pecan sub-committees and Extension Service of Fayette.

The rules are as follows: 1. Anyone is eligible to enter. 2. All entries must contain pecans.

3. There will be four classes: cookies, candy, cake, and bread. 4. Blue, red or white place ribbons will be awarded on the merit of each entry.

5. Arrival-all exhibits will be received between 7:45 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. at the Farmer's State Bank in Schulerburg or from 7:45 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Columbus Municipal Building or from 7:45 to 12:30, Weimar City Hall.

6. Judging will begin at 1:00 p.m. December 6, 1976 by out of county judges. 7. All entries should be wrapped in transparent paper and on disposable plates or containers.

8. An entry will consist of a whole pie, cake or bread; a collection should be 7 or 13 (cookies, candy, muffins, etc.) depending on the size.

9. Each pie should be in an 8-inch or 9-inch disposable plate. 10. Cakes are to be displayed on paper plates or heavy covered cardboard.

ECONOMIST SAYS '77 RICE

OUTLOOK CONTINUES BLEAK

Texas and the rest of the nation are in a tight over the rice situation, and little relief seems on the way for producers, according to an agricultural economist at Texas A&M University.

With carryover to total some 45 million hundredweights by the end of the current marketing year, supply lines will remain choked, says Dr. Randall Stelly, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. "Domestic consumption of rice is at an average level for the year, but exports are moving slowly despite government help," he points out.

The government target price for rough rice was set at \$8.25 a hundredweight while the market price in Texas is currently at \$6.36. This may send producers and farmers into a weak economic situation with an production costs expected to

run \$8.25 per hundredweight in the eastern part of the Texas Rice Belt and \$9.92 in the western section," notes Stelly. "The large supplies and carryovers of rice hanging over the market like a sword held by a hail," contends the economist.

Looking at 1977, U.S. producers expect to plant 500,000 acres more than the 1.8 million acres allotted. However, this will be about 160,000 acres under the 1976 crop. The Texas crop is forecast at 500,000 acres, 40,000 above the allotment figure but 20,000 acres less than this year.

"Market conditions will continue to be plagued by overproduction in the U.S.," contends Stelly. "This along with an average rice crop in other parts of the world will continue to put U.S. and Texas producers in an economic pressure-cooker."
