

VA EXPENDITURES IN TEXAS PASS \$1.2 BILLION MARK

The Veterans Administration spent \$1,203,397,751 in the State of Texas during fiscal year 1976-77. This figure was released by the VA. This represents an increase of \$165.6 million over fiscal year 1975-76 expenditures in Texas by VA.

Ted W. Myatt, Director of the VA Regional Office in Houston, said these figures include \$454,126,639 in compensation and pension benefits to veterans; \$30,176,564 in VA medical benefits and \$45,326,910 in insurance and indemnities. The remainder was spent for construction and operating costs.
