Although, thanks to Social Security and private pension plans, they have better inancial safeguards than they once had, they have been increasing their overall insurance protection, especially life insurance, in the

last few years. The trend is attributed, in part, to the fact that people are more concerned than usual about the economy and about their future and want to borster then sthineint

security. For the same reason, they have been reducing their debt load and have been putting more money aside as

As for life insurance coverage, it has reached an all-time high in Colorado County. The total amount in force is now approximately

\$128,320,000. The basic statistics, for the nation as a whole and for each of the states, come from he Department of Commerce and the American Council of Life Insurance.
