Immunization Clinic In New Location Feb. 11

Beginning in February, the Free Immunization Clinic sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health will have a new location. The clinic will be held the second Friday of each month from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Mission Center, the former Cally Memorial United Methodist Church, 400 W. Prairie St. in Eagle Lake. The date for the clinic this month is Friday, Feb. 11.

Immunization for Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (DTP), Polio, and Measles, Mumps, and Rubella, will be given to infants, pre-schoolers, and school age children. Triclinic, trichloride, will be given to adults.

Personal immunization records, showing dates and kinds of immunization received are given to the parents. For those who have been to the clinic before, we ask that they bring any records they have with them. Parents of children who come to the clinic for the first time are also asked to bring any records of previous immunizations received at other clinics from a private physician.

The parent or legal guardian of each child must accompany them to the clinic. This is a requirement we must follow in order to administer Polio vaccine to the child. Each parent is asked to read a consent form and if there are no questions they will sign the form and the vaccine will be given.

Any questions on immunizations can be answered at the clinic.

Miss Sandra Seaburn, R.N., from the Texas Department of Health Resources, will give the immunization. Assisted by Ms. Shirley Cook, Immunization Service Aide, from Waller County.
