of the city that do not have sewer service at this time and engineering is underway at this time to determine what specific areas that will be taken on the project in the immediate future.

It is anticipated that the city will be for a grant for the drainage program at the appropriate time later this year, under the 1976 program.

Wetmore Project Guidelines

Project for only two cities in this area qualified for full application in the grant application for 1977. Wetmore and Columbus were the two cities that were approved. Columbus is writing a grant application for a drainage program for areas of streams and water and sewer lines to the northeast portion of the city.

UDC Hosts Book Review-Tea In Columbus

The primary target of this program is to clean the creek crossing the golf course and running next to Lake Motors and south near the city sewer plant.

Other drainage areas are also being considered, noted the city manager. The council urged him to continue work with soil conservation and resource, conservation and development officials in this project.

\$100 Refund

The city authorized a refund of \$100 to the bonding company which made good losses revealed in an investigation of the local police department recently when it was shown by City Manager T. J. Smith that a secretary, Lucille Perry, that the company was entitled to a refund due to corrections in some missing police tickets and collections.

City Manager Smith told the city's that Phase II of the city's application for the sewer system was due to begin on Wednesday of this week and will last for some two months.

Lake property, giving evidence to the fact that the wolves are present in great numbers.

Estimates were given during the discussion to the fact that the wolves are doing great harm to the deer population in the county, which will decrease revenue eventually to landowners and businesses in the county.

Court Judge Lester J. Crankel told the court that he had been in contact with Virgil Parsons, head of the Texas A&M Extension Service's wolf trapping program, and was informed that the trapping programs are available through a state, federal and county participation program.

The first would be for 3 months, the second for six months, the third for one year and the fourth for an indefinite time.

Parsons reportedly told the county judge that it would cost the county \$400 per month with the state and federal agencies paying for the remainder of the salary agreed upon for an experienced trapper and for all supplies and equipment needed, plus 10¢ per mile traveled.

It was announced that Parsons plans were to hire J. C. Runk, a resident of Columbus, who has proven to be a good trapper, however his services will not be available the year round since he has a shrimping boat which he operates when shrimp are in season.

After considerable discussion of the matter, Precinct one Commissioner Olof Loeskin, in whose precinct the greatest number of wolves are reported to exist, made the motion to hire a full-time trapper on the six month program as a trial. "We have records of numerous numbers of scalps for which bounties were paid, and we can compare these figures with those on the number of wolves trapped to determine if the program should continue at the end of the six month period," said Loeskin.

He said that residents in the southern portion of his precinct feel an urgent need for this action.

The motion was seconded by Judge Lester Crankel and Commissioner Olof Loeskin. Two Commissioners, Randal V. Voss, voted for the program. Precinct 4 Commissioner C. W. Clegg, and Precinct 3 Commissioner C. R. Clegg abstained.

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
