So you want to change your locks? You don't actually have to replace them. Simply take the cylinders to a locksmith for rekeying, or replace the cylinders with new ones.

No key lock is actually pick-proof, but there are a number of pick-resistant cylinders available. The cost \$10 or \$20 more than ordinary cylinders, but will stop a burglar, or make him take longer outside your door than he'd like.

New locks will actually pick locks. According to a detective on the New York City police department, "The pick man is highly skilled and requires practice for that skill. Unless you've got a lock that's probably won't bother you."

Combination locks are pick-proof, but they are just as likely to blow YOU down. So what would you do a rainy night, if a suspicious character knocked on your door?

You may want to replace your lock for something sturdier. Dead bolts are best of all, assuming you remember to use them. For real security, make sure your door is strong, too.
