New County Agent Speaks To Rotary

Leroy Hajdik, Colorado
County's new Agricultural
Extension Agent, was the
guest speaker at the meeting
of the Eagle Lake Rotary
Club on Wednesday of last
week. He was introduced by
William H. Harrison, pro-
gram chairman for the day.

Mr. Hajdik gave some of
the background of his
educational and personal
qualifications and outlined
the purposes and programs of
the Extension Service pro-
grams.

The agent also outlined
some of the advances being
made by the Extension
Service in control of diseases,
in improving production through
various experimental
programs. He pointed out
that progress is being made
in soil conservation on

livestock, but added that the
disease prevalent in a
many of the beautiful
oaks in the area, remains
unavoidable.

The agent noted that
demonstration practices
where the farmer and
individual can actually see
the program underway and
progress being made are the
"best ways in which to get
across a program or project."

The county agent told
the gathering that Colorado
County ranks 26th in the
state in agricultural produc-
tion and has great potential.
"One of the things which I
have noted since coming to
the county," added the agent,
"is that there are many
young people interested
and active in agriculture."

He said that the average age
of the farmer in this county is
considerably below that of
those in other areas of the
state. "This gives great
promise to the agricultural
program in this county."
