EXTENDED COVERAGE

Most accidents happen at home. A little extra care can prevent them.

In the kitchen, keep pot handles turned IN on the stove, away from inquisitive little hands (for an accidental swipe by a grown-up). Caustic cleaning supplies should be hidden away from children, in a locked cabinet, or high up.

Everyone in the family can keep clutter off the stairs. Toys, shoes, books—everything—should be placed elsewhere. If items are "waiting" to be carried up or down stairs, pile them in a basket at the foot of the stairs or the landing, out of traffic.

Bathrooms are danger areas. Be sure to keep radios, electric heaters, hair dryers, and other electrical equipment elsewhere. Use non-skid mats to protect against falls in tub or shower. Keep medicines locked away.

If you must reach high shelves or light fixtures, use a sturdy ladder. Never climb on chairs or stools.
