AGRICULTURAL WEATHER HIGHLIGHTS THRU SATURDAY:
Partly cloudy, warm and humid weather with showers beginning Thursday in the top for the Texas Rice Belt this week. The winds will be 10 MPH or less today and Wednesday may pick up some during the afternoon and evening.

RAINFALL: Thunderstorms on Monday afternoon and evening. Set up to an inch of rainfall over the eastern "at the rice belt. Most rainfall totals were less than 1/2 inch however.

FARM AND RANCH MANAGEMENT: Farmers with field work to do should note the forecast of showers beginning Thursday. Light daytime winds will favor aerial delivery of chemicals today and Wednesday but increasing winds and showers will interfere with aerial work beginning Thursday.

PLANT DISEASE OUTLOOK: Long periods of vegetation wilts from dew and the forecast showers will increase the likelihood of plant diseases. Farmers and gardeners should keep up on spray schedules for powdery, peach and roset. Some field crops may also be showing signs of plant diseases.
