## Athletic Policies

Rice School District's Athletic Director Jack Grammer has an annual report on boys and girls' athletic programs at the meeting of the board of education last week.

Grammer reported the number of participants and winners of all athletic contests.

Other highlights of his report follow.

Changes in 1976-77  
- Instituted weekly grade

eligibility checks in junior high leading to the same U.I.L. rules required of high school athletes.

Changed junior high coaching assignments in Eagle Lake Middle School. One coach, Mr. Handow, is assigned as head football and head track coach for both seventh and eighth grades. The other coach, Mr. Searle, is designated as head basketball coach and assistant football and track coach for both grades. This allows one of each coach for an off-season program.

The coach at Garwood, Mr. Stansler, coaches both boys' and girls' basketball.

Discontinued combination of Garwood and Sheridan boys into one team in basketball.

Changes in 1977-78  
- Football: All athletes will be involved in the same off-season program during the time they are not involved in a sport. Two-a-day practices will be conducted. Freshmen will be included. A more disciplined approach will be used. An orientation program for incoming freshmen will be conducted.

Golf and Tennis: Will try to recruit a paid coach in Eagle Lake.

Needs

Consolidation of seventh and eighth grades into one.

Another gymnasium at high school campus.

Physical education program in primary school.

Two vans to be used for transportation to and from practices and games, scouting, coaches, etc.

An increase of at least 15 per cent in the athletic

budget.

Athletes' Policies

Athletes are expected to conduct themselves at all times in a manner that will bring credit to the Rice School District, to their family, and to themselves.

Failure to do so may result in disqualification or expulsion from the school.

Athletes are expected to conform to the dress code as set forth by the board of education, and which is observed in each student's classroom.

Athletes who quit a sport are not to be allowed to participate in another sport until the season of the sport they quit has been completed.

Athletes who quit a sport after the first year will not be allowed to return in that sport the rest of their high school career.

Letter jackets will be awarded to athletes during the first quarter of their participation. Athletes will be awarded to athletes who have participated in a sport throughout the time of their high school eligibility at Rice High School. Requirements for lettering in a particular sport will be the same as for that sport.

Athletes will be approved by the director of the head coach of that sport. These policies to be approved by the athletic director.

Certificates will be given annually to participants in each sport in accordance with University Interscholastic League rules.

Athletes will be provided transportation after practice and games to the community nearest their residence. Athletes are not to return to games with anyone other than their parents or guardians.
