Oakland Senior Citizen Believer in Conservation

Mrs. Iris Brown, senior citizen from Oakland, Texas, has long been a believer in soil and water conservation. This is evidenced by the continued productivity of the land she and her husband first worked, then owned, and finally raised a family on.

She was born in Oakland, 75 years ago in 1902. She and her husband first began living on the farm she presently owns in 1928. Then, they bought this 63 acre farm in 1938.

They made their contribution to the food and fiber supply of the country over the years by growing and selling cotton, tomatoes, corn, and sorghum which they processed into syrup. They also raised turkeys, chickens, and water fowl. This involved much hard work and proper care for their land. In later years, Mr. and Mrs. Brown converted their farm into a cattle operation.

Shortly before Mr. Brown passed away in 1973, they had planted some of the farm to coastal bermudagrass. The bottomland where cotton once grew is now a beautiful meadow of common bermudagrass, native forbs and grasses. She strives to keep the soil rich and healthy and to provide adequate food for deer and other wildlife.

Mrs. Brown is continuing to improve and beautify her land. Last October she built a new livestock pond. She has fish on order and will stock with outstock, perch and bass.

The farm has a scattering of beautiful live oak trees on the higher ground and has a creek and pean bottom on the west boundary.

The first project of Mrs. Brown is to clear competing underbrush in the pean bottom to improve, beautify and make it more productive.

The Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District has been helping Mrs. Brown in carrying out her conservation efforts and she is proud of Mrs. Brown's efforts to preserve and improve it, and pass it on to her children. She says that her children will be as proud of the land at that time as she is now. This is possible because of her foresight and vision for her land and the fact she has put in and is putting visible conservation on her land.
