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Columbus Man Charged For Theft of Bottles

Colorado County sheriff's office received a call at 1:15 p.m. Sunday, June 26th, from Larry Rouse of the Bill & John's Store in Columbus that his son, Keith, had observed a black over yellow car drive off from the back of the store after stealing a quantity of empty soda water bottles.

A call was put out on the radio and a short time later the suspect was stopped in Sealy by Sealy Patrolman W. W. Wray. The arresting officer advised the man, James Richard Ritter, 25, of Columbus did not possess a valid operator's license.

His car was due to be heard this Wednesday in county court before Judge Lester J. Crank.

Beginning balances in other funds were (ending balances are in parentheses): Special revenue fund, \$6,827 (\$9,443); service fund, \$70,811 (\$78,196); capital projects fund, \$2,396 (\$2,526); water and sewer fund, \$114,744 (\$117,478); and revenue sharing fund, \$64,738 (\$114,600).

The report showed that the city of Eagle Lake had a total of \$366,888 invested in certificates of deposit or in savings accounts drawing interest on March 31, 1977. Some of the funds are earmarked for special projects, such as, of the \$195,948 in the general fund investments, \$29,901 is earmarked for purchase of fire equipment, \$14,797 for purchase of a new garbage truck, \$13,219 for parks and recreation improvements, \$5,855 for streets and drainage. There is also \$45,515 invested from debt service funds for retirement of street improvement and city hall bonds; \$7,180 from the contingency fund; \$114,600 in the revenue sharing fund in certificates of deposit and has been tentatively earmarked for the sewer extension program for which bids will be opened July 12th.

The future construction of a new city sewer plant, or investment in water and sewer fund; and \$5,000, also in the enterprise fund. Budget comparisons. Budget also shows comparison of actual revenue and expenditures in the general fund and the water and sewer fund.

In 1976-77, revenues were anticipated in the general fund at \$214,000 and actual revenue totaled \$228,689, an increase of \$14,689.

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Audit Shows City Finances In Fine Shape

Eagle Lake City Council, in regular session Tuesday night last week, approved an audit of city funds as prepared by Certified Public Accountant William Pierce Arthur of Columbus, showing all funds to be in excellent condition and for the first time in many years, the city will not be obligated to use any tax money for retirement of bonded indebtedness. Some funds, however, continue to be earmarked for some revenue-funded bond issues.

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
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First 1977 Rice Arrives at Altair Dryer



Ernest Unsell, manager of the Altair Rice Dryer, is shown supervising the unloading of the first truckload of 1977 rice harvested by Leo Korenek and Sons and Bunge Cattle Co. in the Garwood-Nada area Tuesday afternoon. The load of over 40,000 pounds of Labela variety rice had surprisingly low moisture content (18.8) for this time of the year and appeared to be of good quality. Yield figures were not available at press time.

First Rice Combined In Garwood-Nada Area Tues. The first 1977 rice was combined in the Garwood-Nada area Tuesday when Leo Korenek and Sons and Bunge Cattle Co. in the Garwood-Nada area, Rice-Mill area, the Hill area, and on other streets.

The harvest is one of the earliest ever in this county. The first load of the golden grain was brought to the Altair Rice Dryer late Tuesday evening and the rice tested a moisture of 19.8, according to rice dryer manager Ernest Unsell.

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
