Some Mail Rates, But Not Letters, Go Up July 6

The cost of mailing newspapers, books, magazines and other fourth class items is increasing July 6, the U.S. Postal Service in Washington has announced.

The hike will be the sixth in a series of annual increases scheduled when the service became a semi-independent agency.

First class letters are not affected. Rates will include: Second class rates for newspapers increase by varying amounts depending on whether they are entered by weight or by copy and according to distance.

The cost of mailing a book or record will increase from 25 to 30 cents for the first pound and from 10 to 11 cents for each additional pound up to seven pounds.

For non-profit organizations, the cost of bulk mailing a third class circular will increase from 2 to 2.1 cents.
