300 ATTEND WESTERN DIV. FIELD DAY AND TOUR

Nearly three hundred persons participated in the Field Day and Tour at the Texas A&M University Beaumont Research & Extension Center Western Division site on FM 102 northwest of Eagle Lake on Tuesday evening of last week.

The Western Division is composed of six research locations, Bay City, El Campo, Ganado, Katy, and Garwood, with the main headquarters in Eagle Lake. The research is supported primarily by Texas A&M University through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and through rice producer check-off funds.

Dr. Jim Stansel, Scientist in charge of the Western Division operations, noted that work is being carried out to "maximize economic yield and provide food for the lowest possible price and at the same time enable the rice producer to make a fair profit."

He said that producers are spending \$137 million per year for fertilizer, chemicals, herbicides, etc., all of which come into use through research programs.

"This year we have 67 separate experiments involving 450 plots, and 175 of these are on the Eagle Lake site," he said, adding that approximately 70 percent of the research effort is concentrated with rice, 25 percent with soybeans and the rest with other crops such as sorghum, wheat, etc.

Stansel also noted that the second crop was developed through research at the Beaumont station and had added \$25 million per year to the Texas economy and this alone is more than enough to pay for all of the research efforts since 1909.

Stansel concluded by noting that for every dollar spent in research \$17 benefits have resulted to the producer and consumer.

Water Management Tests

One of the most interesting portions of the tour showed water management tests and those explained by Dr. Garry McCasley, soil physicist from Beaumont in charge of water management studies in rice and soybeans. It was stressed that these studies are of particular concern to all since the program is designed to help farmers use water more efficiently to utilize precious water resources.

Before the second stop, those on the tour, traveling on large trailers and seated on hay bales, saw some of the work researchers in Beaumont have done in identifying rice varieties showing some resistance to stored grain insects. Thirty-seven varieties are being tested to see if resistance is manifested under the culture and climate of the Western Division site.

Rice, Soybean Diseases

Dr. Walter Walls, Extension pathologist from College Station, speaking in rice and soybean diseases, discussed work being done in those areas at the Western Division site.

Next tests viewed by the tour were studies being made on seedling dates, variety and nitrogen rate to provide climate information.
