

Truck Rams Into Braden Mobile Home

A spectacular highway crash occurred on the Vienna FM Road 530, at 11 a. m. Monday, July 11, about five miles southeast of Hallettsville. A trailer house being pulled by a truck tractor, and a tank truck hauling water to an oil field location figured in the accident. The trailer house was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Palmer Sommers for some time; it was being moved from the Charles Sommers place after Mr. and Mrs. Palmer Sommers sold it to Earl Braden, Jr. of Eagle Lake where it was being moved at the time of the crash. The tank truck was loaded and headed southeast toward Vienna. It was driven by Henry Leonard Dunbar of Garbato and is the property of Jackson County Vacuum Service of Garbato. The trailer house was struck on the left side. The tank tractor pulling the trailer house came out of the Chas. Sommers place on the south side of the road, and the driver was making a wide swing to right itself on the road, using the ditch on

the north side of the highway to make the turn. The tank truck driver saw the trailer across the roadway and applied his brakes, but the brakes failed, according to the report received. The tank truck continued to roll on and slammed into the house trailer about one-fourth of the way from the front of the trailer house, almost going clean through the trailer house.

Rest Native Grasslands Systematically

More beef and increased grass production are the main reasons for resting native grasslands on a systematic basis. County Fair, district conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service, states that grass is the rancher's crop and cattle is the machinery for harvests the crop with. The more forage produced, the more pounds of beef he markets. Installing a grazing system which allows for systematic rest of native grasslands is one of the best ways to increase production at a minimum cost. According to Fair, most ranches already have adequate cross-fences and water systems. The idea of the system is to allow parts of the ranch to rest while other parts are being grazed. This will result in a more uniform harvest of all the vegetation in a pasture being grazed. The long periods of rest will give the native grasses a chance to grow leaves and roots, store food reserves, set seed, and complete the growth cycle necessary to sustain themselves. Grazing systems can also be designed to use native pastures with introduced pastures such as bermuda grass. This would allow the livestock to graze the bermudagrass in the spring and summer while the native grasses are resting. Native pastures would be used for fall and winter grazing. Fair states that the native grass would serve as a hay crop without having the expense of haying it. Grazing systems can be designed to fit any situation. Native grassland, introduced pastures, and cropland can be integrated into a grazing system which will result in quality forage being available at all times of the year but still allowing for grassland improvement. Grazing systems appear to be the cheapest way to maximize profits while accelerating grassland improvement.

Rice Acreage Drops As Soybean Prices Rise

The number of acres devoted to rice production dropped 8 percent this year in Texas, State Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan V. Brown announced last week, adding that the prospect of higher prices for soybeans lured some farmers away from rice and into the alternate crop. "With the Coastal Bend and Upper Coast counties producing enough last year to put Texas in the No. 4 spot in the nation in hundredweights of rice produced," Brown said, "generally favorable soil conditions and growing we-

Shell Oil Drilling 15,000' Oil-Gas Test at Sheridan

A 15,000 foot oil and gas test has been started by Shell Oil Company in the Sheridan Field in its No. 75 Sheridan Gas Unit on a 10,386-acre lease in the O. K. Winn Survey, A-588, about 3.5 miles southeast of Sheridan. Texas Oil and Gas has announced two locations in this county. One is a 10,700 foot test in the Shimek Field seven miles north-northwest of Sheridan in the No. 1 Grodhaus on a 422-acre lease in the Micah Andrews Survey; another is a 9,500 test in the No. 2 Johnson "B" on a 490-acre lease in the SAAMFG Survey in the Englehart field four miles south-southeast of Altam.

LCRA Adopts \$99 Million Oper. Budget

The Board of Directors of the Lower Colorado River Authority has adopted a \$99,245,000 operating budget for the 1977-1978 fiscal year, beginning July 1. The largest single expense anticipated in the budget is \$85.7 million for the purchase of natural gas, up 25.7 million from the previous year. In his budget message General Manager Charles Herling told members of the board that the authority's revenue from the sale of electricity is based on the authority's requested increase of 8.6 percent in gross revenue.

Fire Fox To Move Industry To Columbus

Fire Fox Corporation, a leading manufacturer of fire trucks in the Southwest, has acquired a building and is relocating its service and repair facility in an expansion of its operation in Columbus. George I. Fox, Jr., Fire Fox president, indicated that no changes would be made at the present that would interrupt the service contracts that are in force.
