"OVER MY SHOULDER"

July's cattle market had its ups and downs, however, as the month drew to a close most slaughter cattle and stocker-feeder calves found a sounder footing. During the middle of July, slaughter cow prices slipped some. Then cows started regaining some of the ground they had lost as cow numbers at markets started decreasing. For the month, cows accounted for around 17 percent of the total market receipts, which is down from last month's average of 22 percent for Central and South Texas markets. The seasonal "new crop calf run" got off to a feeble start with many long-aged calves still beginning their way through the market channels. But an increasing number of these "milk fresh" calves seemed to raise the overall quality of calves, as compared to last month. Better stocker-feeder steer calves by late July were mainly in the \$41 to \$41.50 range, and fancier individuals were up to the middle \$40's. Four to five weight steers were largely \$36 to \$38 with heifers ranging \$30 to \$33. For those hoping July's fed slaughter cattle market would start asserting itself in a positive way, they were disappointed. Fed cattle had no foundation to build a sustained strengthening market with the dressed beef trade continuing to have much room for improvement. Reportedly some "run" got off to a feeble start with many long-aged calves still beginning their way through the market channels. Some analysts see the fed cattle market "warming up." Adding to this optimistic price outlook is the fact that cattle on feed are down 3 percent and the total cattle inventory is down 7 percent from last year according to recent government reports, which could create a beef supply smaller than last year. Also, a seemingly world-wide bumper crop of grain should lower feed costs and cost of grain. Hogs took a roller coaster ride during July. Central and South Texas hogs, nevertheless, ended their month-long ride under pressure. At the month's end top barrows and sows were quotable at \$40 to \$43 with good sows mostly \$36 to \$38. A better hog market outlook than previously forecasted is expected by some. June's hog and pig report showed the total number of hogs mostly unchanged, with hogs headed for the market down as compared to last year's figures. Future hog prices may go higher than expected, but come under pressure this fall with prices in the fourth quarter to average \$40, say some experts. Weights will play a big part in marketing decisions made in August. Hot searing heat deteriorating pastures forcing cattle to market in an orderly flow doesn't allow the market to assimilate the large numbers of cattle, thereby usually causing a softening and weakening of prices.
