County Gets \$396.51 Mixed Drink Sales Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that mixed drink sales reported for the April-June quarter of 1977 totaled \$134 million, nearly a 25 percent increase over the same quarter a year ago.

Bullock said he has mailed checks totaling \$3.9 million to 106 counties and 371 cities as their share of the 10 percent mixed drink tax collected during the April-June quarter.

The remainder of the tax collected, \$9.5 million, stays in the state general revenue fund, the Comptroller said.

Colorado County received a check in the amount of \$396.51 for mixed drink sales. Austin County \$400.17; Fayette \$123.01; and Wharton County \$2,816.96. The city of Columbus received a check for \$225.58 from mixed drink sales.

House of Rep. Completes Work On New Farm Bill

The end of last week witnessed the completion of action on the general farm bill by the House of Representatives.

The House spent nearly two weeks, off and on, deliberating on this 181-page bill which will do much to guide this country's food and fiber production for the next four years. More than 100 amendments were offered to the bill which the House Agriculture Committee had spent three months in writing. This week, House members will meet with their counterparts from the Senate to iron out differences in the two bills. In the earlier passed Senate version, support prices for the basic crops were considerably higher than that in the House bill. President Carter, has stated

he may veto the bill if the conference does not arrive at prices nearer the House version.

Under this bill, farm income is assured through what are known as "target prices." The government makes up the difference between the average market price and the target.

For the 1977 corn and wheat crops, the target prices would be \$2.90 a bushel for wheat and \$2 per bushel for corn. The loan rate, which is the amount of money a farmer may borrow from the government using his crop as collateral, would be \$2.25 for wheat and \$2 for corn.
