Texas Motor Vehicle Regis. Up 1/2 Million

Texas motor vehicle registrations increased more than half a million in the 1976 registration year over the preceding year according to a preliminary count by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Robert W. Towsley, director of the DHT Motor Vehicle Division, said the 1976 preliminary total of 10,220,918 is expected to increase when the final results are tabulated.

The 1975 registration year total was 9,687,981. Registration years from April 1 to March 31.

Beginning with the next registration year, motorists will pay registration fees on a staggered year-round schedule based on present license plate numbers.

In addition to a series of DHT releases giving details of the new procedures, information concerning the 1977 and later registration methods are in the hands of county tax assessor-collectors.

The 1977 vehicle registration will expire midnight, April 1, as usual, and must be renewed by that deadline.

Beginning January 1, 1978, a new law requires that vehicle registrations be converted to a new system with registrations expiring on a staggered basis in different months throughout the year.

To convert to the new system next year, registration periods for passenger cars and light trucks (such as pickups) will be staggered.

All other registrations (including personal plates) will remain the same.

On or about January 1, 1978, you should receive through the mail a renewal notice for your vehicle.

The passenger car and light truck renewals will be staggered by various months. Renewal fees will be prorated accordingly.

Renewal periods will be assigned according to the license plate numbers by the new staggered system.

All future registrations will be for periods of 12 months.

This new system should permit us to serve you more efficiently by having an equal number of registrations expire each month throughout the year.

After 1978, it should eliminate those traditional long lines that form each March at the county tax assessor-collectors' offices.

Fertilize Small Grains At Planting

Adequate nitrogen and phosphorus during seedling development are essential for good stands, early grazing and high production from small grains.

The use for a high level of phosphorus in the seedling root zone has been documented by numerous research and demonstration studies.

Few soils have phosphorus levels high enough to meet this requirement so that some phosphorus is nearly a universal need. Studies and observations also show that smaller amounts of fertilizer phosphorus are needed where the soil is less soluble from the fertilizer is applied in the row.

The amount of contact between the fertilizer and soil is important. It is not the rate of application but the rate of contact with the soil that is important. In fact more than 10 pounds of fertilizer nitrogen will be lost and second, phosphorus downward into the soil slowly, hence benefits to the crop are limited. Since nitrogen moves into the soil and phosphorus is immobile, the 40 to 80 pounds needed at planting can be topdressed.
