Raider varsity basketball players launched their district play on January 6th. As of this writing their record is 4-1 with victories over West Columbia, Sweeny and Edna while dropping a game to Wharton 60-59 in double overtime.

Rice has a solid basketball club with no serious weak spots. The team's scoring average for district play is 62.4 points per game. John Grammer, a 6-1 junior, plays guard and leads the team in scoring with an average of 19.5 points per game and is also first in assists with 5 per game. Grammer is averaging 11.8 rebounds and hitting 77.5 percent of his free throws.

Lonnell Hinton, also a junior, is the Raiders' 6-7 post. Hinton leads the team in rebounding with 21 rebounds per game and also hits on 75.5 percent of his free throws. Hinton is scoring in scoring with a 20.8 point game average. At 6-7, Lonnell can control the boards at either end of the court.

Anthony Prihoda, a 6-1 junior, plays forward and is a dangerous defensive player. Prihoda is in his second year on the varsity and is ranked third in the free throw department hitting 57 percent of his free throws.
