# Second Session Corn-Grain Course Friday

The second session of the corn and grain sorghum production short course being held in this county will be held at 2:30 p.m. this Friday, Feb. 17th at the Garwood Fire Station. The first session was held on Friday of last week.

The session this Friday will have Dr. John Bremer, Extension Service Agronomist, and Dr. Art Gerlach, Area Extension Service Farm Economist, as the program. Bremer will discuss agronomic aspects such as varieties, weed control and fertilization. Gerlach's discussion will cover production expenses and market outlook.

The short course is sponsored by the Colorado County crop committee, Ted Brandt, chairman, in cooperation with the Colorado County Extension Service. Sessions are open to all regardless of race, color, or creed.

**Soil Conservation News**

Gullies occur in most parts of Colorado County, reports the Colorado Soil Conservation Service technicians.

They are caused by the collection, in narrow channels, of water which removes soil from the area to depths ranging from 1 to 2 feet to as much as 20 to 25 feet. They may occur along roadsides, in pastures, or in cropland fields leaving unsightly erosive scars on the land which are rough and unproductive.

These gullied areas can become productive and non-erosive by reclaiming the eroded area. This can be done by shaping the areas with heavy equipment such as a bulldozer. The shaping should be done so that the water flow will not be down steep slopes nor should it be across over-falls. Any topsoil found at the site should be stockpiled and then spread over the shaped area to allow for easier and quicker establishment of grass.

After shaping is completed, and the topsoil has been spread, a good seedbed should be prepared by plowing, disking or chiseling. Seedbed preparation is important because it can mean the difference between a successful failure in the grass planting. An adapted grass should be seeded or sprayed on the shaped area to allow for the season and moisture allow. Sprigging of coastal bermudagrass is generally the best way to plant grass on reclaimed gullied areas in Colorado County especially where the runoff rate is high. Fertilizer should be applied at a high rate for the establishment of the grass, and should be according to a current soil test. A quick vegetative cover needs to be established to prevent erosion on the newly shaped area.

The Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District provides technical assistance through the local personnel of the Soil Conservation Service in helping farmers and ranches solve conservation problems such as gullies. Cost-sharing assistance is also available through the local ASCS office for gully shaping and other practices.

If you have questions about the gully-shaping practice or about cost sharing assistance on other conservation practices, call 732-2778 for information or come by the local Soil Conservation Service office in Columbia. The personnel will be glad to assist you.
