County Buys Bridge Pipe For Prec. 3 Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in a special

session Monday morning approved the purchase of 720 feet of metal pipe for installation of two bridge crossings on Brushy Creek in Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker's Precinct 8.at a total cost of \$26,460.00.

Emergency bids were opened in the special session fonday. Commissioner Lethe will install three 60-foot lengths of the culvert pipe at each of the crossings, even though the road at this time is only 30-feet wide.

Three bids were opener with the low bid of \$36.75 per foot or a total of \$26,460 bid by Leroy Schroeder of Brenham and he was awarded the contract for the pipe. Other bids were by Texas Lumber & Construction of Columbus, \$49.97 per foot or \$35,978.40; and Armco Steel of Houston, \$52.04 per foot or \$37,510. Delivery is expected within ten days.


