Appointment Of County Auditor Draws Discussion

Briscoe Re-appointed For 2-Year Term

Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in session Monday, considered the recent appointment of M. L. Briscoe as county auditor for the next two years and of Mrs. Florence Zajicek as assistant county auditor. The appointments were made by District Judges E. W. Patteson and B. B. Schraub and the auditor's salary was set the same as that of the county tax assessor-collector, \$13,260 in 1979; and Mrs. Zajicek's the same as the chief deputy in the tax office.

Although the acceptance of the order by the commissioners was only a formality, the order drew considerable discussion about the amount of time spent by the auditor in performance of his duties.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker expressed the opinion that the county taxpayers "may not be getting their money's worth." Precinct 1 Commr. Otto Loessin inquired about the number of hours required for the position and Judge Lester Cranek commented that the position took "as many hours

as it takes to get the job done."

Outside Audit In 1979

He noted that every three years the county must undergo an outside audit by an independent auditor under the Federal Revenue Sharing Act and this audit is due to be made in 1979.

He added that it was his recommendation to accept the order and if there are deficiencies, indicated by some members of the court, then they should be called to the district judges' attention at the end of the two-year term, at the end of 1980.

Leyendecker had indicated earlier that he knew of one county department that had requested an audit some time ago and had not (at least to the best of his knowledge) had the audit completed up to the time of the meeting.

Precinct 2 Commr. Rafael Veselka made the motion to accept the order as signed by the two district judges and Commr. Loessin seconded the motion. In the voting, they were joined by Judge Cranek in voting for acceptance of the order, while Leyendecker and Precinct 4 Commr. Bill Stines abstained from voting.

Former Area Resident Iley Crow Dies

Iley Crow, born Jan. 30, 1902, died in his sleep at his home in Houston, January 14, 1979. He had been reasonably active these last few months but had never completely recovered from a heart attack suffered last fall.

Mr. Crow lived most of his life in the Eagle Lake, Lissie and Chesterville area, moving away about 1950. During these years, he was active in the Lissie Evangelical United Brethren Church, serving for many years as Sunday School Superintendent. He is remembered as a good neighbor and a friend to all he met.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, January 17 at Howard Glendale Funeral Home in Houston with the Rev. Roger Showmate of the St. Stephen's United Methodist Church, of which Mr. Crow was a member, officiating. Burial followed at San Jacinto Memorial Park. Mr. Crow's nephews served as pallbearers.

Favorite hymns were played on the organ and a soloist sang "Others", appropriate to his life-style of caring for others.

Mr. Crow is survived by his wife, Thelma Marling Crow; a son, Kenneth; a brother, Bill; a sister, Mrs. Eva (Evie) Adkins; three grandchildren, Mrs. Wendy Smith, David Crow and Bruce Crow; and other relatives and friends.

Preceding him in death were his parents; one brother, Charlie; and two sisters, Mrs. Effie Adkins and Mrs. Kate Mason.

Among those attending the services were Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Adkins, here during her husband's campaign for governor and all who had an opportunity to meet her at that time are eager to renew acquaintance with this personable and vivacious speaker.
