Council Asks For Full Report On Derailment

The Eagle Lake City Council, in session on Tuesday, Jan. 23rd, authorized a request for a fully detailed report of the recent derailment of five railroad tank cars near the Canaris Nursery on West Main Street on January 15th.

Councilman Jimmy Cash, a resident in the area of the derailment, noted the concern of citizens there and asked the council to request the report from Southern Pacific. He suggested that if any negligence be involved, the city find out exactly what the railroad officials plan to do to correct the situation.

The councilman also proposed that the city consider passing an ordinance controlling the parking of any train cars, in the city limits, that might contain a substance that could be people unsafe to animals.

Included in the proposal was a section that would also forbid the

parking of locomotives or engines that are left running, without supervision, in the city limits.

The council authorized the request by Cash indicating that a strong concern to curtail such activity in the city is apparent.
