board voted unanimously to call another election on Tuesday of next week, but only on those items which were felt essential to continuing quality education.

Building Proposals

Supt. E. A. Krivacka discussed the proposed construction included in the bond issue last week. He noted that a self-contained building with four classrooms and a cafeteria is proposed on the property northwest of the present ELMS building. This building would be connected with the present facilities with a covered sidewalk. The new unit would be designed to provide future expansion if needed - due to a sudden increase in population or otherwise.

The four classrooms in the new unit would include two for science instruction with some lab facilities, one for art instruction and lab facilities, and the other for other classroom instruction.

The present cafeteria in the Middle School would be converted to a library; the present library converted back to two classrooms; and the kitchen converted to a teacher aide and teacher workroom and storage facilities thus vacating one room now in use for this purpose for a classroom.

"In effect this will make available seven additional classrooms at the Middle School, increase library facilities and cafeteria and kitchen facilities," said Supt. Krivacka.

The proposed new cafeteria would have a stage available for school and public use (there is now no stage available in Eagle Lake). Present assemblies are held in the gymnasium where the acoustics are far from adequate.

Lakeside Irrigation Pres. Talks On Future Water Problems

Lakeside Irrigation Co. Inc. hosted its annual board meeting for rice farmers in the area at noon on Tuesday when LICO's president Dan Thornton discussed some of the "good" and "bad" news about the water available to rice farmers in the area serviced by LICO.

Thornton reported that the "good" news was that the irrigation company does not intend to increase its per acre charge for watering rice for the 1979 season.

He added that the company is adding a fifth pump at the river plant to "give a smoother flow of water from the river and as means of saving energy." He added however that the application of the company to increase its intake from the Colorado River is still under study and probably will not be approved until 1980, if then.

He told the farmers that the water situation in the lakes above Austin is not good at this time, with Buchanan and Travis below normal levels, despite the rainy conditions which have prevailed in the lower reaches of the Colorado.

The board of directors of the Lower Colorado River Authority are due to meet on Feb. 22nd to make a decision on whether or not LICO will be allowed to take water from the river for watering of the second crop of 1979 rice.

Thornton also discussed other problems facing rice growers in this area. He reported that an application has been made for construction of a new dam in Runnels County, above Austin and if this dam is approved, as it appears may be likely now, according to Thornton, it would reduce the flow of water into Buchanan and Travis lakes by some 15%, materially affecting the amount of water which would be available for agricultural purposes in this area.

He commented that LICO, Garwood Irrigation Co., LCRA and others are making strong opposition to the application for the new dam.

He also reported that work is being done on jetties at the mouth of the Colorado River and included is a diversion project which would release flood water at the rate of 8,000 cu. ft. per second through West Bay. He noted that some definite information needs to be resolved on what is considered excess flood water and other factors which could have affect on water available for local rice production.

The LICO president also discussed possible metering of water, instead of sales by the acre foot; and on a proposal by NASA to make satellite photographs of rice farms in this area to determine acreage and production information. An area five miles by 10 miles wide east and west of Eagle Lake is expected to be included in this area. Further information on this program is expected to be forthcoming.

An increase of 7c per \$100 valuation would be required to finance the issue, based on current evaluation figures. This would increase the requirements for debt service from 19c per \$100 to 26c per \$100 valuation. The district also allocates \$1.29 for local operation, making the total tax rate in 1979-79 \$1.49.

School officials note however, that at the end of ten years, the debt service requirements would return to the present level under the proposed retirement schedule.

Board members and school administration call on all voters to go to the polls next Tuesday so that the decisions made will be a true representation of citizens of the district.

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1979 Rice Program Announced by USDA

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced last week provisions for the 1979 rice crop and noted that no set-aside will be required for the 1979 crop, same as last year.

Other program provisions announced by Bergland included:

- No land diversion payments, none were made for the 1978 crop;
- A target price of \$9.05 per hundredweight, compared to \$8.53 for 1978;
- A national average loan and purchase rate of \$6.79 per hundredweight, compared to \$6.40 for 1978;
- An average allotment of 1.5 million acres, the amount established by law and the same as last year.

Target Price Computed

The target price and loan and purchase rate are computed through formulas set by law. However, if Bergland had found that the \$6.79 loan rate would discourage exports and result in a build-up of U.S. stocks, he could have reduced the rate to \$6.31 per hundredweight.

Rice CISD Voters Give Approval To Bond Issue

Voters in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District went to the polls Tuesday and approved an \$825,000 bond issue by a vote of 446 to 341 for building construction to meet dire needs at Eagle Lake Middle School and Eagle Lake Primary School.

The total of 787 counted votes was nearly fifty percent more than the 536 total counted when a \$1.46 million bond issue was defeated last September, but still was only about a third of the qualified voters (2385) in the district.

Eagle Lake voters went for the issue 370 to 125 (as compared to a vote against all four issues in the September election); while Sheridan voted 35 for, 29 against (in September Sheridan voted for all four issues, also); and Garwood citizens cast 41 votes for and 187 against (they also voted against all four issues last Sept.); thus giving the bond issue a total affirmative vote of 446 and 341 against.

These figures include absentee votes cast in the election.

The funds will be used for the construction of a self-contained four classroom and cafeteria-kitchen unit and other modifications of existing cafeteria, kitchen and library facilities to give the Middle School a total of seven additional available classrooms. Two of the four portable classrooms at ELMS will be moved to Eagle Lake Primary School to add badly needed classroom space there.

However, according to information indicated this week by officials of Southwestern Bell and Garwood Telephone Company, the transfer of ownership is not expected to affect the extended or toll-free service now in effect between areas serviced by the Eagle Lake exchange and the Garwood exchange.

Company officials also indicated regret that the Eagle Lake Headlight was unintentionally omitted from the list of newspapers to whom the story was released for part of the annual FFA show and sale, invite farmers in the area to make plans to take part in the one-mile ride.

Kohleffel and Van Nort represent the Eagle Lake Lions Club, one of the sponsors of the annual event.

Kohleffel said this week that the ride will originate this year at the Sandy Creek Drive-In Grocery on Highway 90A - a few miles east of Sheridan. The ride will depart at 8 a.m. sharp on Feb. 17th and will arrive at the Rice show barn around 11:30 a.m.
