

Courthouse Restoration Plans Move Forward

The judge was asked to contact legal firms that might be interested in handling the certificates of obligation to meet with the court at the meeting on Feb. 26th to discuss this route of financing and costs of such.

When asked about the possible financial aid from the State Historical Commission, Judge Crank commented that this financial aid was stricken from the state's budget for 1979, but could possibly be restored in the future.

Other Court Action
The court accepted deeds to two roads in the Buescher Estates addition three miles north of Columbus and adjoining the Brune's Mill Road on the west side of Cummings Creek. The roads, Aspenberg Lane included 2.92 acres and Buescher Drive 4.9 acres, are in a 312.2 acre tract being developed by Douglas Glass in Precinct 1 of this county.

Anderson Insurance Agency of Columbus was the low bidder offering \$300,000, \$500,000 malpractice insurance coverage for a total of \$800,000 for the four units of the Colorado County Emergency Ambulance Corps will cost the county \$966.58 for the next year, it was revealed after three bids for the insurance coverage were opened at a meeting of the Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday.

Other bidders were: Columbus Insurance Agency which offered the same coverage for \$1,646 and City Insurance Agency which bid \$1,215.05 for the coverage.

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All Not Rosy Down On The Farm!

All of Washington was made well aware last week that all is not rosy down on the farm, as farmers talking about their problems and driving their tractors-paid visits to Congress and the White House.

A number of those making the trip to Washington were from the 10th District, and my staff and I were glad to meet and talk with them during their visits to my office.

The calls this year were for 90% parity on farm products, rather than the approximately 50% producers now get a sympathetic ear on Capitol Hill, but the reception at the White House was not quite as hospitable.

President Carter stated his plans to hold the line on farm prices, giving a firm "no" to the farmers' requests for the 90% figure. He claimed that it would further inflate food prices, which have seen record jumps this past year.

The President further contended that 1978 was a good year for farmers, quoting figures showing that gross farm income was up by about \$15 billion. Some find these figures arguable, however, and point out that actual farm income, after adjusting for inflation, was actually down by about \$3 billion.

Like many other Congressmen who represent rural areas, I am very familiar with the problems of the farmers. I know and realize that the family farm is in danger of disappearing from the country. I am sympathetic to the plight of the farmer and generally support the calls for 90% parity.

Therefore, I joined with a group of Congressmen last week in offering House Joint Resolution 183. This resolution recommends raising the price support level for milk, wheat, corn, soybeans and cotton to 90% parity.

The court also had before it a road petition from a number of citizens in an area adjoining the city of Weimar, asking the county to approve a proposed county road in Commissioner Rafael Veselka's Precinct 2. Veselka told the court that he

had agreed to help the citizens in the area, mostly black, to obtain a road. Frank Parks, Weimar city manager, was on hand to point out that the road, as petitioned, would link FM 202 with Hoover Street which is a city street. The road would be a distance of some one-half mile and could be used by the city of Weimar for right of way for utility lines planned for the area under a HUD Community Development Block Grant.

Veselka said he had promised to build the road if the city of Weimar would complete paper work and obtain right of way.

Parks said that five of eight parcels of right of way have been obtained, but family owners on the other three are "adamant about signing". He noted the road would provide access to the area and would be an aid in fire-fighting.

Since the proposed road is outside the city, it has no authority to condemn and it cannot annex the area without petition from the citizens of the area. Judge Crank told the group with Parks that in order for the county to accept him that since he had been paid a "premium" price for some land, costs for all fencing were not included, a total of only \$472 said Youens.

Commr. Court, Youens Discuss Award On 71 R-Way Parcel

Jim Youens, one of two landowners against whom County Commissioners' Court has authorized condemnation proceedings in order to obtain right of way for relocation of Highway 71 north of Columbus, appeared before the court and asked the court for consideration of additional funds for the 1.36 acres of land needed.

The Texas Highway Department which was authorized by the county to make appraisals and awards for the land and damages, including fencing, had offered \$5999 for the tract, then upped that to \$7710 and a representative told the court that the state, after all considerations, would stand on that final offer.

Youens presented to the court information about the cost of fencing which will be required by him, 1202 feet along the right of way, 642 feet on an inside lane, and 520 feet along the river to keep cattle from getting on the new highway. He also contended that the value of land sold in subdivisions in the area was greater than the highway department's offer. He noted also that the highway department appraiser had informed him that since he had been paid a "premium" price for some land, costs for all fencing were not included, a total of only \$472 said Youens.

He is asking for an additional \$1075 for fencing, a figure which he called a "conservative estimate."

Judge Crank and some members of the court admitted there were some "extenuating circumstances" caused by the taking of the property for right of way and these deserve further consideration by the court and would not necessarily set a precedent in other right of way cases.

The commissioners and Judge Lester Crank expressed surprise that fencing was not included, since it had been on other properties and after much discussion decided to table any action on the matter until the group could make an on-site inspection for reconsideration Feb. 26th.

Another tract, owned by R. J. Kleiman and totaling 72.6 acres, was also in the authorization to proceed with condemnation action when the court met Jan. 22nd.

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Martinez Is Back With Sheriff Dept

Sheriff George (Doc) Mueller, Chief Deputy Jim Broussard and deputies Emil Martinez, Lawrence Neumann met with Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday. The sheriff introduced Neumann to the court and got the court's permission, after a special emergency three hour posting as an addition to the agenda, to return to the sheriff's department.

Because of the new policy manual under which the county operates, it was necessary that the sheriff (or any other department head) first receive permission from the court before rehiring an individual who had been previously employed and resigned.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker urged the court to stick to regulations of the manual and the item was postponed as an emergency addition and the court authorized the rehiring of Martinez.

The court also authorized advertisement for bids for the purchase of a new car for the sheriff department. A 1974 model will be traded in.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Stiles suggested that the court ask for bids on a smaller car with less equipment in order to save money and fuel. He said that such car could be used easily for road patrol work. After Judge Crank explained that the vehicle would also have to serve in regular sheriff's functions and noted the importance of air-conditioning when transporting mental or other patients, the court voted 3 to 1 to ask for the bids at the Mar. 12th meeting on a medium sized vehicle equipped as suggested by Sheriff Mueller. Stiles voted a gain on grounds that "we should be able to get by with a less expensive car."

Jailhouse Repairs
Broussard also reported to the court on repairs underway at the county jail. He noted that progress has been slow but that the third floor of the jail is now operative while repairs continue on the second floor. He said that exhaust fans to move air in the jail are needed and the court indicated they will make contacts for such installation at the jail.

The board of directors also announced plans for a contest to design a permanent emblem to represent MAYC and named a committee headed by Irene Villagomez. The contest began this Monday and will continue for two weeks.

In other order of business a report was given on library books purchased for the Winterman Library on the Mexican American Culture and approval given for the purchase of a Spanish-Dictionary for the library.

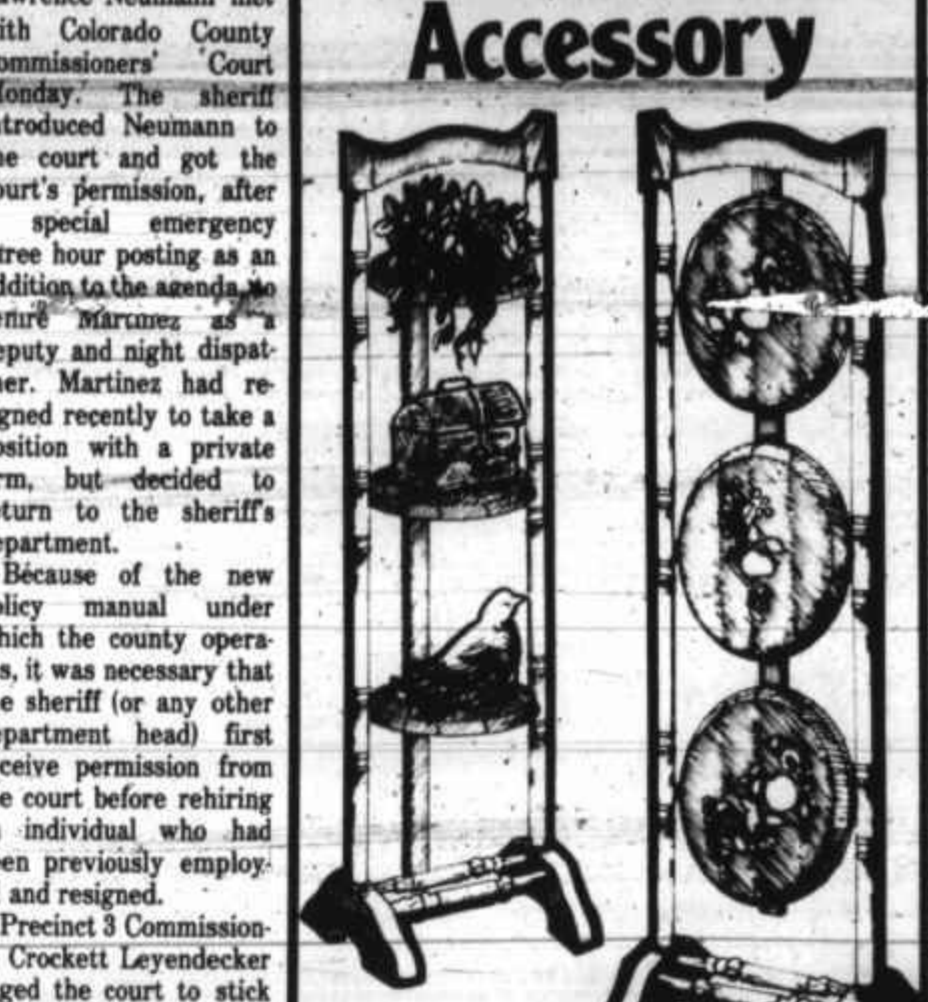
