Henneke Catches Calf At Houston

Butch Henneke, 13 year old 4-H member of the Colorado County 4-H Horse Club, was successful in catching a calf during the February 26 rodeo performance of the 1979 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

6 Check Charges, 3 for Driving In County Court

Three driving cases and six check cases were among those heard before County Judge Lester Crank in February session of the court.

James Gregory Buselman, charged with driving while intoxicated, was found guilty by jury and was fined \$150 and sentenced to 30 days in jail, but a one-year probation was granted on the jail sentence.

Albert Fredrick Janicka, driving while license suspended, pleaded nolo contendere and was found guilty and fined \$25 and sentenced to 15 days in the county jail with a six month probation on the jail sentence.

John Davidson Nash Died In Houston Feb. 23

John Davidson Nash died in a Houston hospital Friday, Feb. 23, 1979, of a heart attack. Mr. Nash was born August 12, 1903 to John and Virgie Davidson Nash of Houston. He was a graduate of Eagle Lake High School, class of 1921, and was a quarterback on the state championship football team in 1920.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Virginia Bryant Nash of Houston; sons, John D. Nash Jr. of Houston and Jack Norman Nash of Tucson, Arizona; 2 grandchildren, Gary and Karen Nash of Arizona; and two nieces, Mrs. Mike Stoddard and Virginia Chaires Nash of Dallas and one nephew, Anson R. Nash, Jr. of Corpus Christi.

Cong. Pickle For Eliminating Fuel Adjustment

Congressman Jake Pickle of Austin is a co-sponsor of H.R. 2368, a bill to eliminate the fuel adjustment clause on electricity bills.

The bill requires an electrical utility to seek permission for additional charges through the state regulatory agency.

Pickle said he realizes the adjustment clause is related to fuel costs, but opposes the practice "because it is completely misunderstood and causes more unhappiness among consumers than any other utility matter."

The congressman said utilities should recover their fuel costs plus a fair return on their investments. It is impossible to lock or freeze utility rates in these days of rocketing fuel costs.

Agricultural weather highlights issued by the National Weather Service for the Texas Coastal Plains. Coastal Plains farmers continue to wait for dryer fields. Good drying can be expected through most of the week. Sunny days will give way to cloudiness by the end of the week. A cold front could even trigger some thunderstorms on Saturday in the Rice Belt. No drastic changes in temperature are likely. Field work is still many days off, especially in the eastern areas of the Rice Belt. Thus, storms this Saturday could cancel some of the evaporation this week. If chemical applications are planned for orchards and home gardens this Saturday, the chances for rain are to be considered. Outlook appears good for small grains this week. The open weather should also help firm up most grazing areas.

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Citizens Warned About 'Asphalt Scheme' In Area

[Reports have been received of a scheme involving asphalt being applied on driveways, etc., in the area and then the operators seek to collect costs in excess of original estimates. Reportedly, the scheme is being used primarily on newly or widowed persons. The following description of the technique used is by Oliver Klimes, District Attorney in Fayette County, where a number of such cases were reported recently.]

The earmarks of the operation are:

"Rural people of the type conscientious about paying their bills are contacted directly at home.

"They are told that the truck in the yard has some asphalt on it left over from a big job.

"The 'strangers' say they can put the asphalt down at a very low price and give a quoted price.

"A so-called 'contract' which gives no address or other information
