### Debate Begins on Tax Relief Proposals

AUSTIN — After six weeks of complicated and exhausting deliberations over one of the most difficult tasks facing the 66th session of the Texas Legislature—implementation of the voter-mandated tax relief amendment—the 13 members of the committee voted unanimously to send their omnibus bill to the House floor for debate beginning next week.

The committee also sent along their recommendations for the bill to be acted on favorably.

When Gov. Bill Clements said earlier this week that Texas "didn't elect me to keep quiet," he should have also added, "or sit still."

Clements has already hoped to Mexico, skipped to Washington (twice) and now says he plans a trip to Russia as the head of a delegation to study food production. The trip will come later this year, whenever the governor finds time on his cramped schedule.

Clements announced his Russia trip on the heels of rumors that he might be going to China. "That trip has always been on the backburner," said one Clements aide. But stories persisted. And confirmed reports that Clements' world-wide, oil drilling firm, SEDCO, was negotiating along with Hunt Oil Co. for exploration rights off the coast of China, didn't help cool the headlines.

Clements, seemingly irritated with all the talk about a China trip and possible conflicts of interest, finally told reporters, "I'm not going to China. I never said I was. How does that grab you?"

A new round of wet soil problems may develop for the Texas Coastal Plains. A cool front was expected to trigger heavy thunderstorms Tuesday and Wednesday as it approached the region. The unsettled weather could start when south winds become gusty and bring back moist air needed for showers. Winds will remain at unusually high levels and then switch to gusty north winds early Wednesday. Rain chances will peak Wednesday morning and then quickly decrease. Weather should be dry, but cooler Thursday through Saturday.

Management: The thunderstorms expected could yield some heavy one and two-inch rainfalls. These, of course, would lead to major soil re-wetting problems, so land preparation and other field work will likely make much less progress. Not all farms will receive such heavy rains, so work delays will vary in length. Drying rates will improve late Wednesday and remain good the second half of the week. This will help keep delays at a minimum. It may also help to check field drainage systems that will be important in removing excess water.

Soil Temperatures: Soil temperatures in both the Rice Belt and Coastal Bend started re-warming and are now in the upper 50s and low 60s. With rain and cooler weather on its way these readings will likely take another swing downward. Soils in the Rice Belt are generally warm enough for corn, but only marginal for sorghum. In the Coastal Bend, soil temperatures are rather low for cotton. Sixty-five degrees is usually the lower limit for best cotton planting. Should you decide to plant in cool soils to avoid rain delays be sure and check with the local county agent on seedling rates and other recommendations for getting best germination in cool soils.

Each clinic will be at the police building from 5 to 7 p.m. You are urged to make plans to have your pets, dogs and cats, vaccinated against rabies, at any of these three sessions.

Cost of the rabies vaccination, and registration as required under city ordinance, is \$4.00 per animal.

### Time For Oak Ball Control

[By Leroy J. Hajdik, County Extension Agent, Colorado County] The time is proper for ball moss control on liveoak trees. The oaks are shedding their leaves and it is best to make spray applications when the leaves are shed and just prior to new leaf development. The reasoning is that the lack of leaves permits a maximum amount of the spray solution to reach the tops of ball moss.

Ball moss can be effectively controlled by soaking the moss tufts with a spray solution consisting of five pounds of Kocide 101 per 100 gallons of water. Kocide 101 is a wettable powder and is a copper based fungicide.

Eighty to ninety percent control with one application is general. This means that a follow-up application is necessary for complete control. Material should not be applied during times of low humidity and should be applied no later than May 1.

### Commr. Court Buys New Sheriff's Car; Votes No On Replacing Another Car

Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in session Monday, approved the purchase of a new automobile for the county sheriff's department. The court declined to act on either repairing a sheriff's department car which has "shown an engine block" or purchase of a second new car for the department.

The court had advertised bids for the purchase of a 1979 automobile for the department funds for which are in the 1979 budget. The court traded in on the vehicle a 1974 Ford which had been wrecked while parking and investigating an accident during the ice storm last month.

Brasher Motor Co. of Weimar was low bidder on the vehicle, offering a 1979 Chev. Impala for \$5937 net with delivery in about 45 days. Don Morrison Ford of Columbus offered a 1979 LTD for \$6077; Boyce Fore of Columbus, a 1979 Chev. or a Pontiac Catalina for \$6,232.75, and Lake Motors, Inc. of Eagle Lake, a 1979 Chev. Impala for \$5,986.80 after trade-in.

The court also accepted an optional bid of an additional \$61 for GR instead of FR 78x15 tires, making total cost of the new vehicle \$5996. The budget had set aside \$6300 for the purchase.

It was later noted that the county may be able to collect some insurance coverage (estimated up to \$1900) on the wrecked vehicle.

Two Vehicles Seized Sheriff Geo. (Doc) Mueller and Chief Deputy Jim Broussard were on hand and noted that the department is two vehicles short after the trade-in of the wrecked vehicle and with a 1974 Chevrolet out of action with the bad motor.

Since it will be 45 days before delivery of the new unit purchased from Brasher, they asked the court to allocate funds for repair of the Chevrolet or to trade it in on a new unit which would be made available as soon as possible to the department.

County Judge Lester Cranek informed the court that it is estimated that it repairs to the vehicle (with estimated value of around \$800) would run around \$1000 for a short block and \$1200 for a new motor. He also added that the tight budget could probably come up with the funds needed for the new vehicle.

Judge Cranek added that with eight cars in the department, and the vehicles traveling well over 50,000 miles each per year, it might become necessary in future budgets to allocate funds for two or even maybe three new cars per year.

### 2 Killed In Crash On Highway 90A Sun.

Two people died in a two-vehicle head-on collision on Highway 90-A, 11.4 miles east of Hallettsville, Sunday night, March 11 at 8:25 o'clock. The dead are Steven Eugene Dodd, 19, of Palestine and Mrs. Jan Alexander-Bruder, 33, of Gonzales.

A third person, Thomas William Bruder, 33, husband of the dead woman, was critically injured. Both vehicles were demolished.

According to State Trooper Robert Hardieck, who investigated, Dodd was driving his 1967 Buick 2-door eastward on a comparatively straight open stretch of highway when he either lost control of his car for some reason or had fallen asleep and his car apparently suddenly moved into the west-bound lane and directly into the path of a 1976 Dodge van driven by Mrs. Bruder. Hardieck said there were no skidmarks on the highway. The vehicles were demolished in the head-on crash. Both Mrs. Bruder and young Dodd were crushed.

Justice of the Peace Wilton (Bill) Hrnich held the inquest at the scene and stated Dodd and Mrs. Bruder died instantly. Mr. Bruder was taken to the Lavaca Medical Center by an emergency ambulance from the Sheriff's Department in Hallettsville. The Kubena Funeral Home took charge of the two bodies at the scene.

Mr. Bruder was still listed in critical condition Monday morning at the Lavaca Medical Center. He was riding with his wife, Hallettsville Tribune-Herald.
