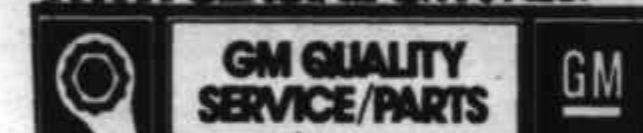

Eagle Lake Primary School principal Major Bengt met with the city council, in session Tuesday night, March 13th, to request that the city police provide more frequent patrolling of the school during prime traffic times - and on weekends.

He stressed that his request was "not a criticism of the police department but rather an attempt to seek a more frequent patrol to help prevent any misfortune from occurring in the campus area during peak traffic times.

Construction work is well underway on the segment of Austin Road from its intersection with Highway 90A north to the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks.

Dean & Keng Paving Company has equipment and employees on the project, and although rains Monday caused some slight delay, work is progressing on base for the road and for curb and guttering the section of the road.

Dean & Keng was low bidder on the project with a bid of \$95,713. Of this amount the City of Eagle Lake will provide \$79,213 from its share of revenue sharing proceeds and the remaining \$16,500 will come from private citizens who own property adjoining the road as their share of the costs of curb and guttering.

City officials ask for the cooperation of citizens for any inconveniences which may be caused during the construction period and asked that traffic on that segment of Austin Road be limited as much as possible until the work is done.
