 In three years on the board, he cast 317 votes and only 7 times were the votes no. "And I voted no in these instances as a positive vote in relation to the welfare of the district."
 It was explained that Arthur Anderson, a candidate for Eagle Lake position, former board member for three years, did not attend because of urgent rice field planting and the threat of approaching inclement weather.
Question-Answer Period
 Among those posing questions to the board members were Darius Briscoe, Mrs. Helen Craig, Mrs. Sue Causey, Paul Causey and Tom Williams.
 Darius posed the possibility of establishing a review board of lay people to consider teacher dismissals; he also questioned about decisions to raise administration salaries and not teachers; the value of purchasing new cars instead of increasing teachers' pay.
 Williams asked the board if they felt that the district has enough black teachers. Smith and Briscoe responded noting that every effort is being made to hire good qualified black teachers but it is difficult to attract young black teachers to the smaller communities. They urged the black community to cooperate in assisting locate teachers and to encourage them to come to this district, and when they do, to help locate housing and include them in social activities.
Public Opinion Survey
 Mrs. Craig asked about

the possibility of renewing interest in conducting a district-wide survey in order to obtain opinions on some problems that might exist, on a grass-roots level. Smith stated that a survey which she had prepared by board member Steve Balas last year, was turned down by the board strictly because the survey, as it was intended, got away from the primary objective - to determine needs for school facilities within the district. "It was turned down by the majority of the board on that basis only." He indicated that a survey, dealing with district-wide problems in other areas, could become a reality if board members so desired such a survey.
 Mrs. Causey queried the prospective board members further on such a survey and Mr. Causey asked the candidates for their opinions on whether or not administrators should have three year contracts when teachers were given one and two year contracts.

County Agent's NOTEBOOK

Sweet Potato Weevil Control

Growers can prevent or greatly reduce sweet potato weevil infestations by using the following procedures:
 Seed - Plant weevil-free seed. If possible, obtain seed from an uninfested area. If this is not possible, carefully examine each sweet potato chosen for seed, reject any that are infested. Store seed separately from other sweet potatoes. Store seed one layer at a time.
 Cover each layer with Imidan dust at the rate of two to four ounces of dust per 50 pounds of seed potatoes.
 Storing places - Empty and clean all storage places in spring, at least a month before the new crops are planted in the field.
 Planting - Plant beds and field plantings should be located away from the previous season's plant weevil infestations.
 Field plants - Plant in fields where sweet potato Good cultural and sanitary practices during storage and in the plant bed should provide weevil-free transplants. However, weevil infestations may develop from outside sources.

 Sheltered air temperatures of overflow.
 Weather conditions should become somewhat drier Wednesday and Thursday. Forecasts hint of a few showers Friday and Saturday.
 Rice Belt: Thunderstorms, capable of yielding rains of two or more inches, may be most numerous across the Rice Belt keeping field drainage systems working properly should help reduce drying time later this week. Rivers and streams could show sudden rises following heavy rains, so cattle should be kept away from flood plains. Weather patterns do not yet favor an extended warm, sunny spell that would promote planting operations.
 Coastal Bend: Cool nights with temperatures below 60 degrees will slow early growth of crops, especially cotton. This could make it harder to judge damage to seedling cotton caused by last week's strong winds and blowing sand. Weather conditions may promote rapid increases of insect populations, particularly aphids. Closer field inspections may be in order.

LCRA Recreational Areas Are Getting A Face Lift

LCRA recreational areas at Lake Bastrop, the cooling pond at the Sim Gideon Power Plant, are getting their first major facelift this summer and spring after nearly 15 years of continuous operation.
 According to Terry Colgan, supervisor of the Authority's parks and lands department, which is overseeing the project, renovation is well under way on the comfort station, concession building and cabins at the South Shore recreation area. North Shore park renovation will follow later this year.
New Rules In Effect
 New park rules implemented by the Authority's board of directors at their March 22 meeting will also go into effect in April.
