

Pecan Grafting Clinic Stated Wed., Apr. 18

Do you want to learn more about grafting pecan trees? You will have an opportunity by attending a pecan grafting clinic on Wednesday, April 18, according to Charles T. Trefny, Jr., chairman of the Colorado County Pecan Committee.

Chern, Texas Agricultural Extension Service horticulturist, will lead the discussion on pecan propagation. McEachern is a noted authority on Texas pecan production. The clinic is being jointly sponsored by the Colorado and Fayette County Pecan Committees in cooperation with their County Extension Agents.

The program will begin at 4:00 p.m. and will be held on the grounds of the Fayette Library and Heritage Museum located in La Grange. In the event of rain at the time of the program, the demonstration and discussion will be held in a building on the Fayette County Fairgrounds located on U.S. Hwy. 71 north of La Grange. Trefny further stated that Dr. George McEachern, Texas Agricultural Extension Service horticulturist, will lead the discussion on pecan propagation. 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Columbus Livestock Mkt. Columbus Livestock Market handled 637 head of cattle at the April 5th sale with the market active and fully steady with the previous week's high market. Owners reported a house full of buyers. Good to choice butcher calves and yearlings sold 70 to 75; Heiferette packer cows 60 to 65; and commercial packer bulls 70 to 75. Heavy Hereford and Angus steer calves brought 89 to \$1.10 and heifers 75 to 85 while crossbred steer calves went 80 to \$1.10 and heifers 75 to 85. Good stocker cows and heifers sold for \$500 to \$600. No. 1 hogs were 44 to 46.5 and lambs 50 to 75.

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
