A Soybean Production meeting will be held tonight, Thurs., May 3rd, beginning at 8:00 p.m., in the Garwood Fire Station and all interested soybean producers in the area are invited to attend.

Scheduled to appear on the program will be Drs. Charles Cole, Art Gerlach and Arlen Klosterboer, Extension Service Specialists.

Cole, an entomologist, will discuss insect identification, economic threshold levels, and insect control measures. Klosterboer, an agronomist, will discuss weed and grasses, herbicides available for their control, time of application, and types of application equipment available.

Gerlach, a farm economist, will project anticipated market outlook for the 1979 crop and review Colorado County soybean production costs.

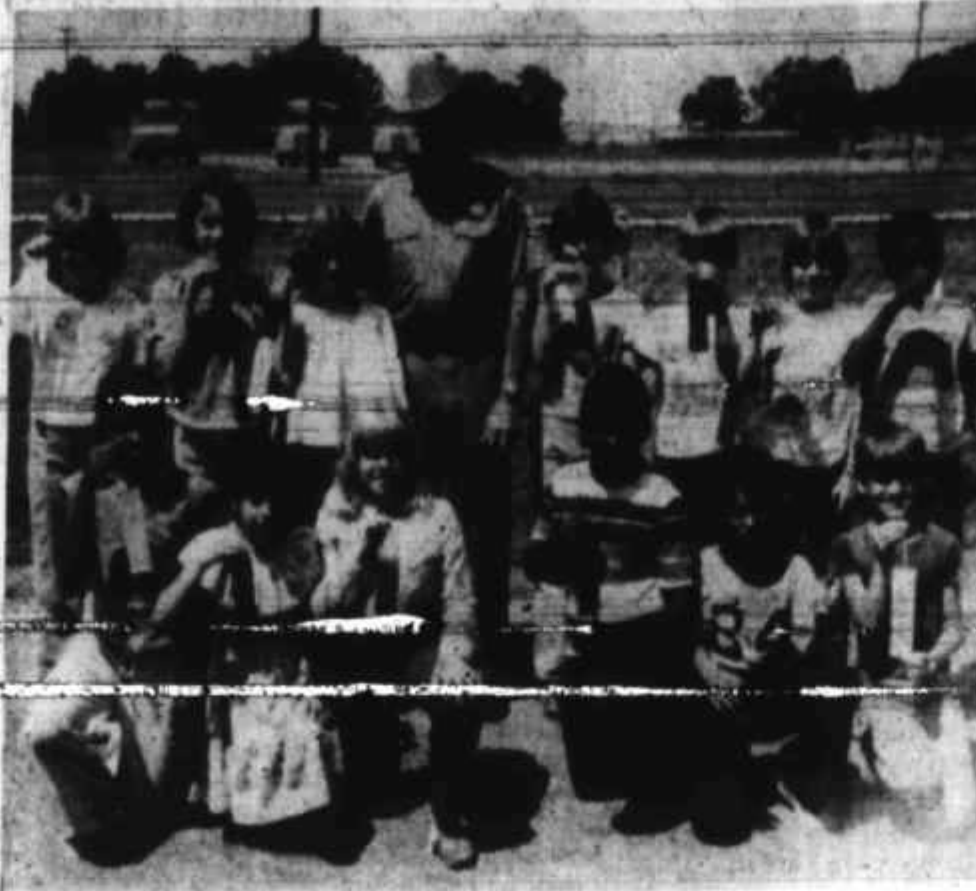

On Monday afternoon of this week, the Raiders saw a 3-0 lead slip away in the third inning as Sealy's Scott Abel blasted a three-run homer to tie the game. Sealy scored another run in the fifth, but the Raiders came back with one in the seventh to tie the score again. In the bottom of the inning, however, Abel belted a single to score the winning run for the Tigers.

The Raiders lost their first two District 20AA baseball games as a result of run-trippers, also. Sealy scored four runs as a result of a grand slam to win the district opener over Rice 4-2. In the Raiders next game, Columbus scored four runs off of three homers to win 4-2.

Senior sprinter Lewis Tillman was a hopeful for the state meet for Rice but was only able to finish third in the regional competition running a 49.27 in the 400 meter dash. Tillman just missed qualifying for state, finishing behind first place winner Duane Lee of Hardin-Jefferson, 48.43 and second place finisher Harris of Buna, 49.06.

John Grammer ran the 100 meter dash for the Raiders and finished fifth in the competition. Jay Toliver of Columbus was first with 9.99.

Robert Barrios qualified for two events in the regional meet and placed fifth in the pole vault but did not reach the finals of the mile run. Charquist of Belville won the pole vault clearing 13.9. Wayne Wright of Willis was first in the mile run and promise to be a contender for another state title.

Thomas Kallina led off the top of the seventh inning for Rice with a single, then Troy Kell, running for Kallina, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt by Rich Farris.

Kell moved to third, then scored to tie the game on a balk by the Sealy pitcher. Two walks in the bottom of the inning started a rally for Sealy with Abel's base hit scoring the winning run for the Tigers.
