Work Nearly Complete On Hospital Helipad

If you have visited Eagle Lake Community Hospital recently and wondered what the construction work was just off the visitors' parking lot, you will be interested to learn that Eagle Lake Community Hospital will soon have its new emergency helipad completed. For the last two months weather has intermittently delayed work on the 65' x 65' structure. When completed, the helipad will offer markedly improved safety and inclement weather landing capabilities for the Houston-based emergency helicopter service. The pad, 40' x 40' square in the center, is designed with structural steel and load bearing concrete to handle any size helicopter now in use or planned in the near future for emergency type evacuations. The 25' apron on each side of the pad is made of 4" thick concrete and is intended to be driven on by ambulance or emergency fire vehicles. The special concrete apron is sloped 2" outward and downward to facilitate the rapid drainage of rain water or fuel spills away from the site in the event of an aircraft accident. Overall the pad is designed to meet fully F.A.A. specifications and to be recorded on national aerial maps of this area, and is available for use by all helicopter flights over this zone of operations. For example: helicopters in transit from north to south, west to east, say from San Antonio to Houston will know of the location of the hospital helipad and could use it to land for emergency medical, weather or mechanical problems, day or night. The pad will also have an all-weather landing lighting system. Initially a financial contribution by Eagle Lake Rice Dryer Co. and contributions of aerial survey and photography site work by Lakeside Irrigation's helicopter have provided the initial funding and support to get the project started. More news later will appear in the Headlight on this valuable new addition to our area's emergency medical services at Eagle Lake Community Hospital.

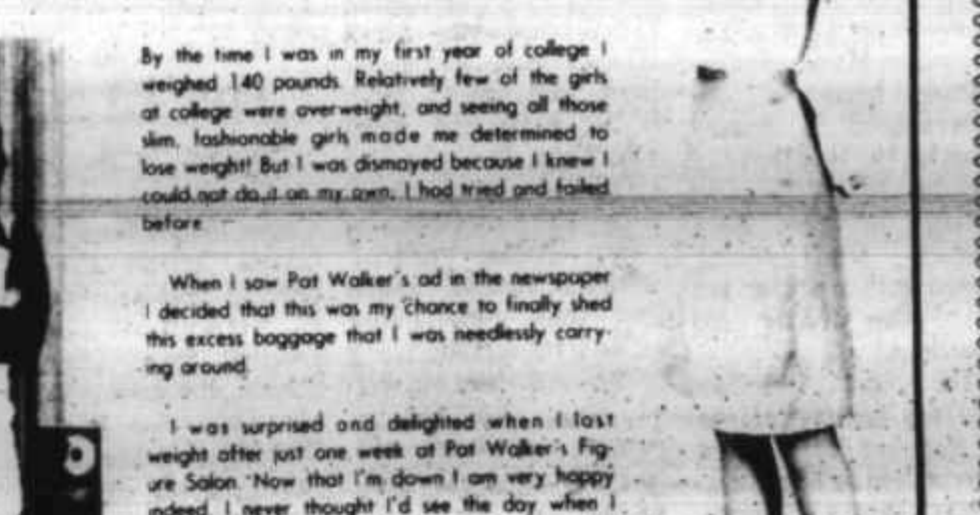
