County OK's Coyote Trapping, 4 Appointed

Final plans have been approved by the Colorado County Commissioners' Court for a new coyote trapping program for this county and four persons have been authorized to serve as certified part-time trappers under the program.

The court approved the certification of Frank Koeke, Jr. and Harvey Cooper of Oak Grove in Weimar-Precinct 2; Joe Skues of Nada in Precinct 1, and Emmett Kveton of Bernardo in Precinct 3 to be trappers under the program. The motion to certify the four was approved on a 3-0 vote with Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Stiles abstaining.

Earlier he had cast a dissenting vote on approval of the policy regulations under which the program will operate. The other three commissioners voted for the program. Stiles had contended in the past that he did not think there was sufficient need for such a program and questioned the legality of spending county tax money for this purpose.

Policy Guidelines:
The program's policy guidelines will be as follows:
Post notices in specific areas where traps are set.
Trapper must use good judgment in places where setting traps to prevent trapping of pets.
A signed affidavit of the land owner must be required for each animal trapped on landowner's property.
The traps and a landowner's affidavit for each must be turned in to the Commissioner of the Precinct where trapped.
Twenty dollars (\$20.00) will be allowed the trapper for each taking to the Commissioner of the precinct.
Trapper must not handle traps for any other individual.
Primary responsibility of trapper lies within the trapper's home precinct.
Trapper may trap in other precincts at his discretion and at the request of landowner.
Any violation of the policy guide will cause immediate removal of trapper.
License trapping under this policy must be approved by the Commissioner's Court.
Trapper must furnish own equipment and transportation.
Trapper is not employee of Colorado County.
A bounty of \$5 for scalps will be paid to other persons presenting scalps as in the past.
The only persons eligible for the \$20 bounty will be those persons designated by the Commissioner's Court under item 10 above.
