Rotarians Hear Of Superior Sand and Gravel Operations

Eagle Lake Rotarians and guests heard an interesting program last Wednesday on the activities of the Hoveringham Group of England-which recently purchased Superior Sand and Gravel Co. The firm has moved offices for the company from Houston to Eagle Lake and is now located in the former Spalinger Realty Building at 209 South McCarty.

Keith Marshall, marketing service manager of Hoveringham Group Ltd. and also vice-president and acting general manager of Superior Sand and Gravel, presented the program. His home is in Nottingham, England, headquarters of the Hoveringham Group.

Mr. Marshall discussed the foundation of the Hoveringham Group originally as an outgrowth of World War II when there was a great need for sand and gravel due to the war effort. He noted that since that time the group has increased its gravel pit locations from six to forty over the entire United Kingdom. The group is also diversified with other interests in insurance, landfill operations, waste control plants and 40 to 45 ready-mix concrete plants.

Superior Sand and Gravel opened a plant recently on Wells land just west of the Colorado River near Altair and is establishing another location on Highway 71 south of Columbus. Marshall indicated that the firm will erect more gravel plants in this part of Texas in the future. He also indicated that the company will expand its operations in this state into other fields, with possible ready-mix concrete plants in high construction areas such as Houston.

He expressed great pleasure in the acceptance of his company by local citizens since the firm moved its operations here from Houston on May 1st. He noted that his company plans to be active in its contribution to the economic welfare of the area.
