Tickets On Sale For July 4th BBQ

Citizens of the community are reminded again that tickets for the barbecue chicken dinners to be served as part of the Fourth of July celebration here are now on sale and the tickets MUST be purchased in advance not later than June 28th.

The barbecue chicken and trimmings (to be prepared and served by members) will be dished out at the Eagle Lake Recreation Center's picnic grounds from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. only on July 4th. Tickets will not be sold at the picnic grounds unless some food is left when all with tickets have been served after 1:00 p.m. Those with tickets must pick up their plates by 1:00 p.m. The chamber will not be responsible for plates to ticket holders after 1:00 p.m.

The tickets, going at \$3.00 each, may be purchased at numerous locations in the city, including the First National Bank, and many business places and also with chamber directors or at the chamber or city offices in the Municipal Building.

Once again the chamber's Fourth of July committee reminds that food will be served only to those who purchase tickets in advance and that these tickets must be purchased not later

than June 28th.

A street dance will begin at 8:00 p.m. and continue until midnight with the Country Playboys providing the music. There will be no admission—free-will donations will be accepted.

All activities will end at 12 midnight and at that time clean-up of the area will commence.

Teenager Diet - All Summer - Think, Plan

Teenagers can "think" food and "plan" fun during the summer to shape up. "Think" milk group foods—and choose to make milk shakes with plain or non-fat milk, vanilla flavoring, a little sugar and lots of ice instead of eating a banana split piled high with scoops of ice cream. Remember, a malted milk contains approximately 500 calories and a regular milk shake contains 400 calories. Compared to these, a glass of fruit—juice contains about 100 calories.

"Think" meat group foods—and make hamburgers from lean ground meat instead of using ground meat with more fat. Broil meats instead of frying them. "Think" fruit-and-vegetable group foods—and use less butter or margarine on baked potatoes.

Use less fat in seasoning vegetables, and use less salad dressing on salads. Choose fruit juice with lots of ice as quick refresher instead of a frosted punch. Or, eat a plain apple rather than a slice of apple pie.

"Think" bread-and-cereal group foods—and use less butter or margarine on bread. Eat a plain roll instead of a sweet roll, and eat no
