39th Boys State Convenes Wed., June 6

More than 900 high school juniors will assemble on the Campus of The University of Texas in Austin this Wednesday, June 6 for the 1979 session of American Legion Boys State, State Commander, George H. Skelly of San Leon, has announced.

The program sponsored by The American Legion, State of Texas, is an annual event in which the organization teaches boys the responsibilities of citizenship in an actual "do it yourself" type program from which comes its motto, "Learn by Doing."

The approximately 924 boys will be housed in 21 Boys State Cities with each city further divided into two precincts, one for the Federalist and one for the Nationalist political party. Each Boys State City is named in honor of a Past State Commander of the Legion who is now deceased.

On Tuesday, June 12, the citizens of Boys State will visit the State Capitol and actually sit in chairs of the office to which they were elected and run the state government for a day.

The defendant allegedly is the holder of trust note signed by Hruzek against mineral interests and a trustee sale had been set for June 5th. The plaintiffs obtained a temporary restraining order stopping the sale. A hearing has been set on June 11th to determine if the temporary injunction should be made permanent or not.

In a suit filed June 4th, Johnny B. Williams and Lillie Williams of Weimar filed suit against Vera Mann Pellerin of Eagle Lake. The plaintiffs allege that on Oct. 14, 1975 they purchased a lot from Pellerin and before the deed was recorded, the defendant allegedly refused to sign a new deed and the plaintiffs ask the court to establish deed and title to the lot.

Use Of Satellites In Agriculture Explained

Stansel Describes How Satellite Used In Crop Predictions

Dr. Jim Stansel, director of the Texas A&M Rice Research Center at the Eagle Lake area, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday of the past week bringing an informative program on the LANDSAT satellites, built by General Electric, and how they are used to predict crop production.

The LACIE (Large Agricultural Crop Inventory Experiment) project, using Landsat satellites, will be doing experiments in the Eagle Lake area this summer. The project will use a five by six mile area east of Eagle Lake and south of Highway 90A, to develop programs for prediction of crop production, time to flood, time to apply herbicides, time to drain and other important issues in rice production, said Stansel.

Stansel reviewed the Landsat launchings and how the "birds" can be used in agriculture. He said the satellite now orbiting the earth is making fourteen trips per day around earth and is orbiting 570 miles above earth.

Stansel told the Rotarians and guests that the intensity and capabilities of the satellite have been improved to a point "where the bird is capable of determining the kind of wrist watch on a man's arm from 570 miles out in space."

Stansel said the need for global observation of agricultural information became evident when Russian predictions on wheat. A normal crop was predicted but actually a great drought greatly reduced production. As a result, prices of wheat were depressed because of the anticipated supply and the United States contracted to sell wheat to Russia at depressed prices when actually a shortage developed and prices escalated.
