Drownproofing Can Prevent Water Tragedies

Spring's warm, sunny days mean an increase in swimming, boating, and water skiing for many people across the state. But even good swimmers should know about drownproofing before making their first splash.

Drownproofing is not a swimming technique like the breaststroke. In fact, the object of drownproofing is to survive in water by using as little energy as possible. In tests using this method, even non-swimmers have been able to remain in water eight hours or more without assistance.

Drownproofing Steps involves the following steps:

- First, fill your lungs with air and float face-down in the water. Salt water allows you to float higher than fresh water. Let your head, arms, and whole body float freely, much like a jellyfish, until you need air.
- Then slowly use your arms and legs, or one arm and one leg, to lift your head above water enough to breathe. A gentle scissors or "frog" kick can be helpful in pushing upward as long as it doesn't take too much energy. The motion of the waves can be helpful as well.

With your head above water, quickly exhale and catch another breath. Then slowly return to a floating position by extending your arms downward and bringing your

Infants at very early ages recognize the difference between mom and dad. In fact, one study finds that contented infants will crawl to their fathers at their mothers and sometimes more frequently.

Babies can learn who plays with them, and it's often dad. In addition, many men involved in child rearing say it is personally rewarding. Overall, research reports that fathers' involvement in child rearing is beneficial and satisfying for the children and for both mother and father.

Also, more researchers are studying father's roles, as men take a more active role in managing the home and children while their wives pursue careers outside the home.

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Honor America Program Starts Flag Day, June 14

Under the leadership of the American Historical and Cultural Society, Inc. of Washington, D.C., an annual effort gets underway on June 14 to renew the country's faith in itself and the principles upon which it was founded.

The Society's "Honor America" program launched in 1970, sets aside the 21 days between Flag Day on June 14 and Independence Day on July 4 as a period to celebrate and honor America (89 Stat. 211).

President Carter in his 1979 Flag Day Proclamation points out that official sanction for this national tribute was created by a joint resolution of the Congress. "To focus the attention of the American people on their country's character, heritage and future well-being, the Congress has also by joint resolution of June 13, 1975, set aside the 21 days from Flag Day through Independence Day as a period to honor America (89 Stat. 211)."

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County To Reconsider Flood Program

Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Salinas, who reside just north of Columbus and whose home recently was isolated by flood waters from a nearby creek, appeared before Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday to reaffirm the fact that the contract between the county and the Houston-Galveston Area Council calls for her to work 32 hours per week, and not 24 as the court indicated at the session May 28th.

Mrs. Salinas reminded the court that when the senior citizens services and the extension service offices were separated last year, the 12 hours which formerly had been assigned to secretarial duties, are now being handled by her hence she should be compensated on the basis of 32 hours per week. It was noted that she has been receiving pay for 32 hours per week, but last month County Auditor M. L. Briscoe told the court that he could not approve the payment of the full 32 hours since the minutes reflected that the director should be paid on a 24-hour week basis.

Judge Cranek explained that if the county had gone into the program six years ago, it would have become necessary for a permit to be issued for each construction project, and before such permit could be issued an inspector would have to determine if the intended construction was in the 100-year flood prone area. If it was so determined the construction would have to be at a height exceeding the flood level for that area.

Judge Cranek added that the cost of the flood insurance is relatively inexpensive and he stated that the court, at a later meeting, might want to reconsider the matter and reaffirm its position of the past or possibly to enter into the program.

He added that those in a flood-prone area are unable to obtain financing from banks or savings and loan associations unless the property is under the flood control program and adequate insurance is taken on the property.

The commissioners asked Judge Cranek to obtain latest information on the program and to have the information for consideration at a July meeting.
