I would like to take this opportunity to again remind our citizens the information they need to obtain when they accept a check from anyone. If the subject has a driver's license, obtain the number, along with their social security number and their address. If they are in a vehicle and you are able to obtain the license number do so. When a warrant for theft by check is received by the Sheriff's Office for a subject who resides outside the County, it is very hard and at times impossible to serve the warrant without this information. Just a few minutes of your time, when you accept a check, may result in you receiving your money should the check turn out to be no good.

waste material used for filling in, so it should be checked and most likely, fertilized.

The Confederate Jasmine has fragrant small white flowers, and is an evergreen. The coral vine dies down in the winter, but reappears in the spring. Bleeding Heart is another vine which has snow white flowers accented with brilliant red hearts. If winters are mild, it will come back from the roots in the spring. Covering it with dirt in the fall could insure it for another season. The wisteria vine, and the honey suckle are two other showy vines. Both of these need large areas, since they spread so far, and are quite weighty. Because of its wide spread and weight, wisteria is best grown in a tree form. It should be supported with some kind of trellis or its equivalent for the first few years; then pruned so as to keep down and form a tree. A wisteria vine which has not bloomed needs phosphate under it, super phosphate. If this does not produce blooms, try root pruning about two or three feet from the trunk of the plant with a sharp-shooter.

A profitable vine is the cucumber, which may be planted in June, and

County OK's Only Bid On Road Paving

Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday approved the bid of Dean & Keng Paving Co. of Giddings for paving projects in the four precincts. The bid was only one received by the court, although opening of the bids was delayed for nearly two hours since another contractor had indicated that he was interested in submitting a bid.

Dean & Keng offered to do 4.8 miles of double asphalt paving in Commissioner Otto Loessin's precinct 1. Cost will be the AC 5 asphalt will be 56¢ per gallon and the county will furnish cover rock and haul to spreader box and the contractor will spread the rock for \$3.00 per cubic yard. Included will be 1.8 miles on the Lehrer Camp road, 2.2 miles on the Tait-Walters road, .8 of a mile on Garwood streets.

In Commissioner Rafael Veselka's precinct 2, there will be 5 miles of seal coating and 2 miles of double coated paving with the contractor furnishing MC 30 prime oil for 69¢ gallon and AC 5 asphalt for 56¢ gallon and spread rock for \$3.00 cubic yard. The 5 miles of seal coating are on the Jack Boeker road and 2 miles of paving on the Shumbers road.

In Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker's precinct 3, the contractor will do 3 1/2 miles of seal coating on Bruner Mill road, Schobel road, and Freiburg road, and 1.75

miles of new paving including .75 of a mile on Pieper League road and 1 mile on Piney Woods road. The contractor will provide AC 5 asphalt for 56¢ per gallon and will spread rock for \$3.00 per yard.

In Commissioner Bill Stiles' precinct 4, the contractor will do 2 miles of double asphalt coating as patch work on Calhoun road, road to Superior plant in Altair, the Walker road near Ramsey and others. The contractor will provide MC-30 prime oil for 69¢ and AC 5 asphalt for 56¢ and will spread rock for \$3.00 per yard. The contractor will also furnish a 2 1/2 yard loader for 60¢ per cubic yard.

Speed, Load Limits Set

The court approved a load limit of 20-tons and a speed limit of 45 miles per hour on County Roads 201, 202, and 203 northeast of Weimar, on the recommendation of Commissioner Rafael Veselka.

A hearing on the proposal was called for Monday morning but no one appeared for or against the proposals.

The commissioner had noted earlier that truck traffic is increasing on the road and load limits were needed to protect the county roads and speed limits needed to increase safety factors on the three roads.

The court ordered the cancellation of performance bonds by Hydrocarbon Gathering, Inc., post-

Signs

The first signs usually seen have been incoordination of the rear legs; this has been followed by urinary incontinence in about half of the horses. In mares, the most obvious clinical signs include opening and closing of the vulva and dribbling of urine which causes loss of hair on the inner part of the hind legs due to urine scalding. Geldings may show a loss of hair on the ventral abdomen near the prepuce. Urine may drip continually and become intensified if the animal is caused to move suddenly. Some mares may abort.

When affected animals are removed from the pasture and fed a balanced ration, they usually improve, but complete recoveries have not been reported. Both the urinary incontinence and ataxia have been observed in some horses for as long as 5 years.

Prevention

1. Keep equines off sudan type pastures. 2. Do not feed freshly cut sudan species hay to equines. 3. Horses fed well-cured sudan species hay did not develop this syndrome. 4. Many treatments have been used in affected equines, but with little success.
