hunting bows from M. T. Windham and for burglary of the Windham camp house May 12, 1979;

Charlie Williams, indicted for forgery of a \$2049.07 check on Gonzales Livestock Market Mar. 5, 1979;

Juan Hernandez Rojas, Vincente Pena Rios and Antonio Aguado for alleged aggravated assault Feb. 19, 1979 by kicking Apolonio Reyes in the head;

Alfred Don Richardson, indicted for aggravated assault by using a handgun to threaten James Brooks, an officer, Mar. 31, 1979;

Richardson is indicted for unlawful possession of a firearm, a felony; Mar. 3, 1979;

Charles Freezer, indicted for alleged aggravated assault on a peace officer, Constable Joe Dusek of Weimar, on the arm with his fists.

Other indictments included: Allan Kales, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, a 1978 truck owned by J&H Electric June 6, 1979;

Arthur John Smith, for theft of a 1968 Chev. from Guy Botard, Dec. 24, 1978;

Eula Jane Hoskins was indicted for theft of services after allegedly giving a \$1000 check to Don Morrison Ford Feb. 3, 1978 for services and then she stopped payment on the check which was made out to and endorsed by Louis Nelson.

Guadalupe Pena was indicted for involuntary manslaughter as the result of an accident on IH 10 Mar. 10, 1979

Stiles' Motion Dies
Stiles made a motion that the court issue certificates of obligation immediately in order to give more time for those who wish to petition to do so. Judge Crane pointed out that the attorney hired by the court to handle the certificates of obligation has said that the notice cannot be issued until such time as the new legislation becomes effective (August 29th).

Stiles said that by that time \$60,000 in fees will be paid to the architect and he believed the people should have the opportunity to decide whether or not such a large amount of money should be spent on the project or not. When he accused the court of "robbing the county citizens of their rights," Judge Crane took time out to make a rebuttal after he declared that Stiles' motion had died due to a lack of a second.

Judge's Rebuttal
Judge Crane commented that Stiles' comments had no substance and that they were strictly the feeling of Stiles.

"I have not had one citizen of the county speak to me opposing the action taken by this body on the courthouse restoration," He added that he felt that adequate notice has been given on the matter, and noted that it would cost the county \$7,500 to call a referendum election.

It was noted that a committee of substantial citizens recommended that the courthouse restoration be carried out. He further stated that if the building is not restored and it has to be replaced, it would cost an estimated \$15 to \$19 million (if it had an appearance of a court-

house). "We're talking about spending three-quarters of a million dollars to make this building last for at least another 50 years. It has been standing since 1889 and is structurally sound."

Stiles then asked the judge and the commissioners if they would honor a petition if presented legally. The commissioners expressed the opinion that if the people they represented were included in the petition they would give consideration to the petition.

Questions Bill Payment
Stiles brought the matter up again when it came time to approve payment of accounts. Included in the bills before the court was a statement from Will-rod's firm for \$20,588.75 which the statement noted was one-fourth of the 12 1/2% fee which the county contracted with the architect, based on the initial cost figure of \$650,000.

The fee it was explained was for Phase I of the architect's services or for preliminary work required before beginning the actual working drawings. Another 50% of the fee will be due at the time the final plans and specifications are completed. The final payment will include adjustments that will be required due to the increased costs of the project since the contract was signed June 13, 1977. The final phase would include the archi-

tect's actual supervision of the construction project.

Stiles voted against payment of the bills, the remaining commissioners Otto Loessin, Crockett Loyendecker and Rafael Veselka voted for.

Jail Renovations
Judge Crane also gave a report on the renovations at the county jail to bring it up to the Texas Jail Standards. A ventilating system is being added and a communications system will be installed to all four corners of each floor and a pre-fab building added to the northwest corner for a booking room.

The Commissioners' Court Monday, on the recommendation of the County Juvenile Board, Judge Crane and District Judges E. W. Patterson and B. B. Schraub, certified the jail as a juvenile detention area. It was also noted that the third floor work has been nearly completed and will be available for the juveniles and also for female prisoners. Up to this time the juveniles and females have been lodged in the Lavaca County jail at Hallettsville.

School, however, Supt. Krivacka indicated Monday night that several changes have had to be made in order to get the project within the \$825,000 in bonds which were voted for the addition.

A meeting of the building committee, Supt. Krivacka, Asst. Supt. DeShazo, board members Steve Balas, Bill Appelt, Jane Clipson, Principal James Crabbe, and staff members Edith Miller and Mabel Franklin, are expected to meet at 3 p.m. Friday at Eagle Lake Middle School to discuss the plans with representatives of the architectural firm of Morris and Associates.

Supt. Krivacka reported to the board that the final count on the average daily attendance in the district for the past year showed the district had an ADA of 1456 as compared to 1482 last year. A total of 1462 had been projected at the start of the year.

He also reported that the district received \$4,822 from the University Interscholastic League as the district's share of the proceeds from the state basketball tournament in which the Raiders participated earlier this year.

Six students are working at schools in the district under the Neighborhood Youth Program with 86% of the funding coming from the state; a hearing with the State Board of Education on the appeal of former Rice teacher Jim Majors is set for 9 a.m. July 6th in Austin. Majors requested the hearing after the Rice Board voted not to reconsider renewing his contract for the 1979-80 year.

Also, a new contract was approved for use of the Region III Service Center to provide educational materials for the next school year at a cost of \$1 per student or \$1456.00.

Depository Contract
The board approved a new two-year contract, beginning Sept. 1, 1979, with the First National Bank of Eagle Lake to serve as the school's depository. The bank agreed to pay the minimum interest on all CD's but added that it would negotiate with the district for higher interest rates whenever possible.
