

3 Get Probation In Fayette County Drug-Making Case

Two Houston brothers and another man convicted of manufacturing the controlled drug methamphetamine in a Fayette County farmhouse were placed on probation Friday, June 15th.

The jury in State District Judge Sam Robertson's court Thursday convicted the brothers, Robert Wendell Loomis, 25, and Carl Everett Loomis, 20, along with David Doran, 24, of manufacturing an estimated \$500,000 worth of the drug at a farmhouse near West Point.

City Gets \$17,796 Sales Tax Check

Texas cities shared \$218 million in rebates from the one percent optional city sales tax during the first six months of this year.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday in announcing the city's June tax allocations.

This figure compares to \$196.4 million that cities received during the same six months during 1978.

The City of Eagle Lake received a check for \$17,796.89 for the period ending May 31, making 1979 payments to date total \$58,508.24, slightly below the 1978 total of \$59,081.72.

The check for the City of Columbus was \$22,116.98 to make the 1979 total \$76,206.85 up 6%; Hallettsville received \$19,978.89 making the 1979 total \$59,737.44, up 14%; Seely received \$22,354.16 to make the 1979 total \$80,839.73, up 18%; Wallis received \$3,365.83 and its 1979 total is \$7,907.44, up 7%; and Weimar received \$10,954.98 to make the 1979 total \$32,721.21, up 2%.

Many Students Uninvolved In State's UIL Programs

The current energy shortage apparently does not apply to Texas' high school students involved in University Interscholastic League activities.

Participation in the athletic, literary and academic, and music programs reached record highs in 1978-79, reinforcing the long-standing contention that one of two graduating seniors in Texas has taken part in a UIL activity during his high school career.

Across the board, participation by schools remained stable, said Dr. Bailey Marshall, League director, with the exception of girls' basketball, which increased by 55 schools.

Individual participation, however, continued its upward surge, with more than 62,000 playing football, 30,000 and 23,000 in boys' and girls' track respectively, and 25,000 and 19,000 in boys' and girls' basketball respectively.

Elsewhere, participation in boys' baseball soared the 16,000 mark, while more than 20,000 took part in boys' and girls' tennis. Approximately 8,000 participated in boys' golf and 4,000 in girls' golf.

Swimming figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls', while cross-country boys' and girls' figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls'.

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Cattle Grubs Costly To Cattle Producers

[By Leroy J. Hajdik County Extension Agent]

Each year between mid-June and early September, Texas livestock producers can control costly cattle grubs by applying systemic insecticides.

During late fall and winter, the cattle grub appears on the backs of animals. It's too late to begin control measures then since most of the damage has already been done.

However, applying a systemic insecticide—one which is absorbed into the animal's blood stream—can control grubs effectively between mid-June and early September.

In addition to controlling cattle grubs, the insecticide will also provide contact control of horn flies for two to three weeks. Ticks on the animal will also be controlled. This makes the overall cost of treatment favorable.

Cattle grubs cause greater losses than any other cattle pests. Besides damaging meat and hides by their burrowing, they lower beef cattle gains and production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated in the millions of dollars each year.
