NO Tickets To Be Sold at Serving Area On July 4th

Citizens in the area who plan to enjoy the delicious barbecued chicken dinners to be offered as part of the Fourth of July celebration here, are reminded that they have just over one week left in which to buy tickets to the dinner. The chamber reminds that NO tickets will be sold at the Eagle Lake Recreation Center picnic grounds on the Fourth of July. All tickets must be purchased in advance.

The cost of the tickets is \$3.00 each and the barbecued chicken and trimmings may be enjoyed in the shaded area of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center picnic area, or may be obtained in a fast curbside service line. Free tea will be provided to those dining in the picnic area. Cold drinks will also be available for purchase.

The tickets may be purchased not later than June 28th at the bank, the city hall, the chamber office in the Municipal Building or from many of the local businesses.

Plans are to have a special table set up in the bank Friday afternoon of this week for sale of the tickets.

The chamber reminds once again that tickets MUST be purchased in advance. There will be no tickets sold at the picnic grounds unless some plates are available at the end of the serving period at 1:00 p.m.
